Round One – 10th April 2010 Tamworth Swans v New England Nomads

Number One Oval, Tamworth

After a week of rain, the sun came out to greet the Tamworth Swans as they hosted the New England Nomads in the first round of the 2010 Country Energy Tamworth Australian Football League. The dead track, coupled with a light breeze on a warm day presented magnificent football conditions as the Swans set about defending their Premiership and the Nomads atoning for missing last year's finals series.

After a spirited start to the game, as both teams fought hard for the ball from the centre and struggled for a time for clear possession, it was the Swans who took command of the contest. Working hard in the midfield, the Swans were dominant in the centre clearances and capitalised on this gluttony of possession as their imposing forward line piled on eight goals for the quarter. Late in the quarter the Nomads caught the Swans defence napping from a free kick to post a major score, but it was footballing lesson for the visitors in the first period, trailing by 51 points at the end of the quarter.

The Swans have the advantage of the breeze in the second period, and commenced where they had left off, running out of the centre and driving the ball inside fifty. Some wayward shots at goal provided the Nomads with some mercy, and they were able to provide some response as the early season fitness started to tell and the match opened up. Kicking six goals to the Nomads two, the Swans extended their lead to 74 at the long break.

Emerging from the half-time huddle a little flat, the Swans met a newly determined Nomads outfit who appeared to have refused to concede the issue. Raising their efforts at the stoppages, the Nomads forwards were provided with quality service that they had been starved of to that point, and responded with four straight majors to open the quarter. Swimming against the tide for the first time in the match, the Swans worked hard to the contests to respond but struggled for rhythm throughout a quarter that was clearly won by the Nomads. Regardless, the Swans appeared to have done enough in a tough third period to put the matter beyond the visitor's reach, taking a 57 point lead into the final quarter.

The last period saw the Nomads determined to run the match out, throwing themselves at the ball and running hard across the ground. A resilient Swans backline repelled much of these offensive charges, and as the quarter dragged on it saw both teams carry tired legs to the contest and struggle for clean possession. Kicking three goals to two, the Swans last quarter effort was enough to hold their earlier advantage, and they ran out convincing 68 point winners in a match that was really put to bed at half-time.

New Swans coach Gary Harriott was happy to get off to a winning start in 2010. "I couldn't really fault our performance in the first quarter, it was a really good effort," he said after the match. "There are some things that we need to work on in that second half, but at this stage of the year it was a good effort."

Many of the Swans first gamers impressed, with Nathan Keam and Will Priest goaling in their first match. Priest was named the Player's Player. Lachlan Rowling was named the best for the Swans. The coach's award went to Simon Freer. Andrew Donohue was given the green ant for his on-field renditions of 'The Stomp'.

Round Two – 17th April 2010 Tamworth Kangaroos v Tamworth Swans

Number One Oval, Tamworth

The first local derby of the year ushered in a new era of football in Tamworth, as the Swans and the Kangaroos faced off in the first match under lights in the country music capital. With both teams having started the season with impressive first round performances, a tough and close encounter was anticipated in the opening clash to decide the Billy Holder Cup.

The opening of the match did not disappoint, with determined efforts seeing both midfields struggle to clear the ball cleanly from stoppages. The Kangaroos goaled to open the night's scoring, but the Swans clicked into gear from there and kicked the next three majors. The Kangaroos replied with a double to close the quarter, with the teams separated by just three minor scores to the Swans.

The second quarter became a dour struggle, with neither team able to string together controlled possessions. With a midfield choked by the desperation at the contest and strong efforts from both backlines, the forwards were starved of quality possession. Both teams kicked two majors in the period, and the Kangaroos minor scores brought them back to within the barest possible at the main break.

The Kangaroos hit the ground running in the third quarter, with their midfield dominating in clearances and their forward line enjoying their first real quality ball of the match. Taking full advantage with three straight goals, the Kangaroos momentum looked set to steamroll the Swans. Lifting in the backline, forced behinds by the Swans put the brakes on the Kangaroos push enough to allow their midfield back into the contest. Rising to the challenge, the Swans dominated across the centre and spoiled their forward line with a gluttony of possession. Kicking three goals but wasting good chances, the Swans has clawed their way back into the match and trailed by a single point at three-quarter time.

The start of the fourth quarter saw the tough and tight football exhibited to that point continue. With determined efforts right across the paddock, clean possession was at an absolute premium. It was the Kangaroos, though, who made the best use of the ball early in the period to kick two straight goals. The Swans lifted again and poured forward, only to waste chance after chance in front of the big sticks. The Kangaroos dropped back in the last ten minutes to clog the Swans forward line as the brave Swans launched themselves on the offensive. A late Swans goal set up a frenzied final five minutes, as troops of both persuasions poured into the Swans forward fifty. With standing room only in front of goal, the Swans were unable to get the clean possession needed to kick the winning goal, and the Kangaroos in the end ground out a tough win by just two points.

The Swans had their chances and were left to rue missed opportunities in a hard but clean local derby. Janson Doughty was magnificent in his backline debut and was named best for the Red and White. Dean Finlay was named Player's Player with another typical though amazingly courageous effort. The coach's award was split between Josh McRae and Ben Sowden. The green ant went to Jason Ludgater for five star story telling at the Oxley Bowling Club.

Round Four – 1st May 2010 Tamworth Swans v Narrabri Eagles

Number One Oval, Tamworth

A sunny Tamworth day with a light breeze saw the Tamworth Swans host the Narrabri Eagles for the first time since 2007. Still somewhat of an unknown entity in their returning season, all reports were that the Eagles were a structured, disciplined and determined outfit, and the Swans entered the match knowing that anything less than a dedicated effort would be punished.

This knowledge was clearly at the forefront of the Swans thoughts in the opening quarter, which the Swans dominated through their trademark attack on the ball right across the ball. This first use of the ball was telling, as the Swans took full advantage to kick six majors to a single from the Eagles to leave by 32 points at the first break.

It was much of the same into the second quarter, as the Swans machine rolled on against a determined but generally outgunned Eagles side. Maintaining their determination at the contested ball, the Swans communication saw them use it to best effect, with kicking six goals to two they went into the long break with a commanding 58 point advantage.

Fulfilling expectations that they would provide a tough and disciplined contest, the Eagles emerged in the third quarter to take the match to the Swans. Kicking three goals for the period, the Eagles still struggled to stop the rampaging Swans, who failed to miss in six shots on goal and put the matter to bed by the third break with a lead of 80 points.

Refusing to lay down, the Eagles presented as the much keener side in the final quarter, running forward with vigour and dominating a flat footed Swans outfit. Whether the fuel tickets had been burned or the cue was in the rack, the Eagles clearly had the best of the last quarter and kicked five goals to the Swans two to add a little respectability to the scoreboard and to go down gamely by 63 points.

Swans coach Garry Harriott was very happy with his charge's effort in the first three quarters, and whilst disappointed with the finish to the match viewed it with some pragmatism with a number of key players missing and the earlier effort possibly telling at the end. Mitchell Firth was unstoppable in the first half and was named best for the Swans. Jason Darcy was equally impressive and was given the choccies from his team mates. The green ant was awarded to Garry Harriott, who appeared less than fit on game day after a match-eve bender.

Round Five – 8th May 2010 Gunnedah Bulldogs v Tamworth Swans

Wolsley Oval, Gunnedah

The Tamworth Swans travelled to Wolsley Oval in Gunnedah, somewhat of a hoodoo ground in recent years, missing two key players but confident of a strong showing. With a disappointing start to 2010, the Bulldogs were under pressure to get a result at home and a keen contest was expected.

The Bulldogs opened the match like a team with their season on the line, attacking the stoppages with vigour and running with determination across the park. With a forward line presenting strongly, the Dogs delivery into their forward line was superb. Straight kicking in front of the sticks saw the Bulldogs steal an early break on the Swans, and any attempt at an early red and white revival was thwarted by their hard working midfield and a determined backline. Able to muster only three majors to seven straight goals from the Bulldogs, the Swans were made to look pedestrian and went into the first break trailing by 22 points, fearful that the Curse of Wolsley was to perpetuate.

The second quarter saw the Swans emerge with the determination of defending Premiers, and a lift in intensity across the centre was matched by purposeful run across the ground. With a forward line moving to the nut and fluid movement of the ball across the ground, the Swans looked at their best and dominated the quarter to take the ascendency back from the Dogs. The Bulldogs were brave and found a late reply to drag themselves back into the contest, and to see the Swans lead by the slenderest margain of a single point at the long break.

Intent on not seeing their hard work from the second period go to waste, the Swans were right on the job in the third, bringing themselves to the football first and controlling the match as a result. Kicking a couple of goals to skip away, the Swans found the Bulldogs game as always and still dangerous on the run. The Bulldogs counter saw them trade goals with the Swans to keep themselves in the match, but the tide seemed to be turning red as the Swans finished the third quarter with a ten point lead.

The contest was willing into the final quarter, with the Bulldogs clearly not conceding the match and looking to take the challenge up with the Swans. Looking impressive when able to run in space, the Swans were frustrated by a hardworking midfield from the Dogs who refused to allow the Swans any easy possession. Again, the Swans skipped away slightly before both teams traded goals the Bulldogs lifted to lay siege to the defensive fifty of the Swans. Pouring numbers back, the Swans resolute defence held true before they were able to break into attack and provide Mitch Firth with the sherrin with the space he loves to run in. Consecutive goals saw the Swans slip away to run out winners by 23 points in a match played at a hectic pace from the get-go.

Premiership coach Rick Watt ran the side in the absence of Gary Harriott, and he was impressed by the effort. "When we ran the ball, we looked very good, as good as we did last year. Their enthusiasm beat us at the start, but after we started moving the ball I thought our effort across the ground was pleasing," he said. Lachlan Rowling controlled the centre of the ground for the Swans and was named their best. Gavin Knee was superb running forward from the midfield and was the choice from the players. The green ant was awarded to Will Priest for a series of events that could well become the next Quentin Tarantino feature.

Round Six – 15th May 2010 Tamworth Swans v Muswellbrook Cats

Number One Oval, Tamworth

A cool morning lifted and a warm autumn day welcomed the Muswellbrook Cats to Number One Oval for the sixth round of the 2010 Country Energy Tamworth AFL season. Despite having had disappointing results so far this season, the Cats were known to have some hard and experienced footballers, and nothing less than a physical challenge was expected.

The Cats were right up to those expectations from the first bounce, being first to the ball and making the most of their clearances by playing in front and attacking the football. A shell-shocked Swans looked stagnant as the Cats roared into the match and kicked the first three goals. After taking stock across the centre, the Swans rushed and panicked when in possession and piled on a flurry of behinds from kickable positions. Lifting to at least be in the contest with the Cats, the Swans were lucky to kick four goals to be tied with the visitors at quarter time.

Clearly disappointed with their first quarter effort, the Swans took control of the second period and fought for the ball for the first real time in the match. Playing tough across the backline, the Swans kept the Cats scoreless for the period and on occasions looked as impressive as ever when running forward. It was at best a patchy effort however that saw them kick five goals to take a 35 point lead into the long break.

After sorting out their tactics to overcome the plane trees at half-time, the Swans met a determined and physical Muswellbrook outfit at the start of the third quarter. Winning plenty of ball by their commitment at the contest, the Cats became dominant in the centre and took control of matters halfway through the period. Showing some class with the ball in hand, the Swans were able to withstand the spirited challenge of the Cats and went into three-quarter time with a break of 41 points.

With the contest more or less dead, the Cats were still flexing their muscles at any contested possession and the final quarter almost broke down into a slugfest. With both teams struggling for clean possession and only rarely disposing of the ball with any quality, the sherrin became second to the man for much of the last chapter of the match. Having met the Cats challenge, the Swans had a little more run at the end of the match and were able post four goals to the Cats two to come away with a somewhat unimpressive 52 point victory.

Swans coach Garry Harriott was frustrated at the end of the match, having seen his charges show flashes of brilliance and a good dose of ordinariness. Simon Freer was named the Swans best with a strong game at half forward. He also won the player's player. The green ant was awarded to Dean Finlay, who was not looking at his beautiful best after the match having headbutted the fist of an opponent.

Round Seven – 22nd May 2010 Inverell Saints v Tamworth Swans

Sports Centre, Inverell

It was a horribly undermanned Tamworth Swans that made the trek north to take on the Inverell Saints in the seventh round of matches in the Country Energy Tamworth AFL. Billed during the week as a grand final replay and an 'eight-point' fixture, the match was switched from Varley Oval due to a clash with a rugby league tournament, and the secondary venue and number of missing Swans tarnished the atmosphere about the game.

The Saints certainly showed little sign of any such tarnish in the opening of the match, as they launched a merciless assault on the Swans. Brutal at the stoppages and out-running the Swans across the ground, the Saints kicked any number of majors before shell-shocked Swans were able to take stock midway through the quarter. The Swans looked able to match the Saints when they committed to the contested ball, but the Saints eagerness and numbers around the ball told as they ran into space and collected cheap goals. Kicking seven to the Swans lone goal for the period, the Saints went into the first quarter with a surprising and dominant 38 point lead.


Any hope of leniency from the Saints was short-lived, as they jumped straight into the saddle and unleashed upon the struggling Swans into the second quarter. Taking themselves consistently first to the ball, the Saints sliced through the Swans almost at will until a few brave Swans put the halt on their midfield march. Lifting in patches, the Swans looked to be standing up to the Saints, but their efforts were too patchy as the Saints rebounded from any Swans attack to spear the sherrin forward. Running rampant, the Saints went into the long break with a lead of 69 points.

Implored by their coach to make a decided effort at the contests, the Swans entered the third period with some determination to match it with the Saints. Isolated efforts across the park offered some frustration for the Saints, and saw them truly earn their possession of the ball for the first time of the afternoon. The defensive effort to repel the Saints told on the Swans scoreline, as their lonely forward line were starved of any quality ball and were unable to score for the quarter. The Saints bench numbers told as the quarter dragged on, with the Swans leaking cheap goals as the Saints ran past hard, an effort that saw them post a lead of 129 points at three-quarter time.





Round Twelve – 3rd July 2010 Tamworth Swans v Gunnedah Bulldogs







Stuart Harris was tireless across half back and was named the best for the Swans. Josef Atkinson was another shining light on a dim day and was awarded the Player's Player. The green ant was awarded to Josh McKenzie, who terrible pass to a team mate in front of goal found its way through the big sticks.

Elimination Semi-Final – 28th August 2010 Tamworth Swans v New England Nomads



Josh McKenzie's seven goals saw him named the best for the Swans and also the Player's Player. 
