Thanks Ump Round

This weekend, Round 4, is Thanks Ump Round, an initiative which encourages everyone to have a positive impact on the match day at all levels of football to assist with recruiting and retaining umpires.

The League has requested that all clubs show their appreciation to the umpires by:

- Both teams lining up before the start of the game and shaking hands with the Umpire
- Captains to shake hands with the umpires after the game
- Coaches to shake hands with the umpires before and after the game.
- Ground announcements introducing the umpires and the fact it is Umpire Appreciation Round.
- 'Silent theme' whereby crowds are encouraged not to abuse umpires/players etc.
- Post-match presentation in the home club rooms recognising the match day umpires.

It would be greatly appreciated if Team Managers

could be responsible for ensuring that the above things are adhered to.

Parent Behaviour

One of the biggest dislikes of junior umpires is the calling out of "ball" by Coaches and parents – unfortunately the parents grab on to it and become more vocal if the Coaches do it. It may be a timely reminder to avoid the practice. Those of you who have children who umpire will understand how frustrating this can be.

Community School Programs

In recent weeks Steve Zayler has with the support of the Club conducted a number of Clinics at Schools in the Stonnington area and at the Housing Commission flats. Steve, with the assistance of Sam Dunnell, Tom Morris and Will Russell is to be congratulated for helping promote Australian Rules football to our local community and for encouraging Kids to come and play at the Club. Steve is a great ambassador for our Club and plays an important role in ensuring that we continue to be a broad based inclusive Club.

Parking

While I appreciate it is sometimes difficult to find a park, could I ask parents not to park in the car park behind the Charles Lux Pavilion, which is reserved for the Catering Committee, Committee Members on duty and for Coaches. Your cooperation would be appreciated.

Team Managers

The Team Manager has an important role on Match Day in acting as a spokesperson for the team. So if a Coach or parent has a problem with a decision made by an Umpire, you should speak to your Team Manager. Under the MSJFL Bylaws (24.5.2) **Team Managers may approach the Umpire(s) at the breaks or at the end of the match to seek clarification of any matter that has arisen during the match, but must not under any circumstances engage in any debate or dispute with an Umpire as to the manner in which the game is being umpired.**

If there is an incident before, during or after a match where the conduct of an opposition player or official is of concern then the correct procedure is for the Team Manager to either speak to the umpire (as above) or email details of the incident

to me so the matter can be referred to the league. They will then issue a 'please explain' to the opposition Club and/or formally investigate the matter.

Hoodies

We have had very positive feedback from players who have received their Hoodies. The balance of the Hoodies will soon arrive from our supplier so our Team Managers can distribute them. If your child has a Hoodie which is too small, please email Madeline.

A number of parents, Coaches and Team Managers have asked if they can purchase hoodies. The answer is 'yes', provided we get a minimum order of 50. I will arrange for Madeline to email an order form to all parents in the next few days.

The Club has given each player a free Hoodie this year. Next year the Club will charge for them. As Kids grow out of them the Club may consider some sort of swap shop arrangements for next year.

Player Game Time

There have been a few complaints regarding player game time and player positions on the ground. Consistent with MSJFL policy, we believe U9 and U10's is more about kids getting involved in footy, learning how to play and having fun, and not just about winning. There is an expectation that every child should get equal game time. There is also an expectation that players should experience different positions on the ground.

For older age groups, we are conscious that there are ladders and finals and accept that games are coached more with winning in mind. Therefore players should start to be put in positions that the coach thinks best suit the child and the team. There may be, at the Coaches discretion, more flexibility on the amount of game time. Match day jumpers are provided by the club at no charge. Please note that playing jumpers remain the property of the club and must be returned at the end of the season.

FOOTY BOOTS & MOUTHGUARDS

These must be purchased separately by parents. Our policy is strictly 'no mouthguard, no train or play'. Mouthguards must be worn at ALL training sessions & games. Any child without a mouthguard on game days will not be allowed on the field.

PARENTAL BEHAVIOUR

The PJFC has adopted the following Parents' Code of Conduct:

1. Remember that children participate in sport for their enjoyment, not yours.
2. Encourage children to participate, do not coerce them.
3. Provide a positive focus on your child's efforts and performance rather than on winning or losing.
4. Encourage children to always play according to the rules.
5. Remember that children learn best by example.
6. Appreciate good performances and skills shown by all players from home and opposition teams.
7. Support all efforts to remove verbal and physical abuse from on and off-field activities.
8. Respect officials' and umpires' decisions and teach children to do likewise.
9. Respect the rights, dignity and worth of every child regardless of their gender, ability, cultural background or religion.
10. Show appreciation and be courteous to PJFC coaches, officials, team managers, administrators and fellow parents. Without them your child could not participate.

Will Reagen led the boys out against a determined South Melbourne Reds side at Toorak Park on Mother's Day. And the overcast conditions and light drizzle weren't enough to prevent the Blacks from recording their first win of the season.

First quarter: Coach Chris urged the boys to show the endeavor that they had started to show in the game against Waverley Park and to attack the ball, and the boys responded by starting strongly in the first quarter. Max was dominating across centre half forward and centre half back and marking strongly to propel the boys into attack. The first goal of the game came from another strong mark from Max at centre half forward and Arthur marked strongly at centre half forward but the siren sounded and the boys went into the first break leading 1.2.8 to nothing.

Second quarter: The coach asked the boys to work hard to continue the form they showed in the first quarter. Will responded by working hard to get the ball and was rewarded with a goal. Charlie, Andrew H and Will G were also working hard as South Melbourne mounted a comeback, but Max stood up in the last line of defence and stopped South Melbourne from scoring again before half time. At the main break the boys were 2.2.14 to 1.1.7.

Third quarter: During the break, Coach Chris urged the boys to keep running hard to get the ball and told them that they were good enough to win their first game of the season. As the second half got underway, Max continued to work well with Charlie P who was running hard and getting plenty of the ball. Arthur was also playing well along with Will G who had lifted, as South Melbourne scored their second goal and were closing the gap. South Melbourne were attacking again late in the third quarter but Max marked strongly on the wing to repel the attack and Prahran went into the final break with a one point lead, 2.3.15 to 2.2.14.

Fourth quarter: At the three quarter time huddle the coaching staff urged the boys to "do it for the mums" and to keep working hard to get the ball. But South Melbourne started the quarter better

and scored the first goal allowing them to hit the front in the last quarter for the first time in the game. Prahran didn't panic and the boys peppered the goals before Andy was able to penetrate South Melbourne's defensive press and put the boys in front with a great goal with minutes remaining. South Melbourne kept attacking but the run of Charlie, strong marking from Max, and great defending by Will preventing South Melbourne scoring in the dying seconds of the game and the siren sounded to give the boys their first win of the season.

Coach Chris presented the best on ground awards after the game to Max for Prahran and to number 16 for the Reds. The boys deserved and enjoyed their first win of the season and, with the great coaching and guidance they are getting from Chris and Richard, are starting to play really well together
