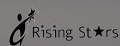

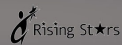
Knox Raiders vs. Bankstown Bruins

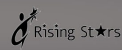

OPENING OF NAB STADIUM

A SLAM DUNK FOR BASKETBALL'S REFURBISHED NAB STADIUM

A national under-14 basketball competition is about to get underway at Brisbane's recently refurbished basketball stadium at Auchenflower.

Sport Minister Phil Reeves said the official opening of the refurbishments on the eve of the competition showed how far the complex had come since it was flooded in January.

"Brisbane Basketball's dedicated staff and volunteers are a great example of Queensland's fight back after the floods," Mr Reeves said.

"In January the stadium's ground floor was completely inundated, ruining two basketball courts, the canteen, reception, foyer, first aid room, wiring, bathrooms and car park.

"Thanks to Brisbane Basketball, Brisbane City Council, the State Government, the National Australia Bank, and the RACQ Foundation, the centre was open again for business in May, with a total rebuild cost of over \$1 million."

State Member for Mount Coot-tha Andrew Fraser said the re-named NAB Stadium is the hub of basketball in Brisbane and its repair is a credit to everyone involved.



"With the centre up and running, Brisbane Basketball was able to attract 24 teams from all across

Australia to play in the national under-14 championships," Mr Fraser said.

"The competition is bringing 300 players, their families and supporters to the local area, boosting the economy and the profile of junior basketball."

Mr Reeves said the Queensland Government remained committed to developing infrastructure to meet the sport and recreation needs of local communities.

"We've spent over \$13 million to help all types of sporting and recreation clubs to get back on their feet after last summer's devastation," Mr Reeves said.

"We are committed to providing sport and recreation opportunities for all Queenslanders, that's why we're seen as the Champions State and the Events State.

"It is all part of the government's *Toward Q2: Tomorrow's Queensland* priority to make Queenslanders Australia's healthiest people."

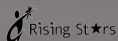
Logan Thunder vs. Southern Tigers

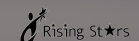

Sturt Sabres vs. Geelong Cats

Both teams had a rocky start, with each team struggling to find the bottom of the net, in a very tough first quarter, the score line ended at 6 a piece at the end of the first quarter.

The second quarter saw Geelong take an early lead with three quick buckets from O'Leary, but Sturt managed to fight back in the final minutes with only a 2 point deficit at half time.

In the 3rd quarter, the teams traded baskets with Geelong holding a 4 point lead up 37-33. In what was a see-sawing 4th quarter, the crowd was put on the edge of their seats as Sturt continued to make runs at Geelong. The atmosphere inside the stadium was palpable as every time Sturt came up trumps on offense, the Cats managed to claw themselves out. In the final minutes with the Cats holding the lead, Sturt had a chance to tie it all up, but failed to convert. A stop and then 3 ball made it a 3 point game with the Sabres needing another stop to ensure they could have a chance to send the game into overtime. With Sturt taking a time out giving the Cats a chance to draw something up, they failed to execute, thus leaving the Sturt still trailing by 3. Sturt used their last time out and drew up what looked to be a very good look at the 3 ball for the tie. The pass went to hands and then through them to have the ball go out of bounds for Geelong to hold on and win.

A: The team does get nervous, but we convert that energy into a level of intensity and if we continue with that who knows where we finish.

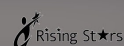
Q: You have been playing for a while, you've improved obviously since the last time I saw you in double bottom age under 12s. What are your aspirations for yourself?
