A Message From the CEO

Welcome to the last newsletter before our AGM.

A significant amount of planning and work has gone into ensuring we get the best out of our day together. As a lead in to that day I thought it would be useful to outline for those of you attending how the day will look.

As normal we will be accommodating the **Basketball Foundations AGM** into our day and while there will also be the usual BBNZ AGM business to be conducted, including the receipt of the financial statements and the election of directors, there will be a good opportunity to work on and discuss basketballs future.

The significant part of the day will be a series of work sessions around the **All of Basketball Pathway Plan** (ABPP). The workshops will focussed on parts of the work that **Chris Simpson** has been doing on our behalf. They are:

- 1. The Community Participation Plan
- 2. The Basketball Development Plan

The works sessions are designed to enable us to have some solid discussion around the two critical parts of our game. There will be two or three sessions where Chris's initial findings and recommendations will be shared, discussed, critiqued and understood.

These will not be sessions where we will decide on the final parts of the plan but they will rather seek to flash them out so that in the weeks immediately after the AGM when Chris circulates the results of that work then visits associations around the country there will already have been some solid thinking by delegates as leaders of the game, about it future. Further information will be sent to associations prior to the AGM so you are able to have a think about it and discuss it prior to us getting together on 09 June.

3x3

Over recent weeks discussions regarding **FIBA's 3x3** plans and BBNZ's strategy around this version of the game have been taking place. Many of the long-term 3x3 plans are part of Chris's work on the ABPP. However there are associations already running great 3x3 events and competitions.

BBNZ has been in discussions with a number of associations and around the Board table in order to get the strategy built the right way. Some of those discussions have also included talks with **Glen Green**, **There's A Better Way**, regarding his community based programmes that are run to support and develop disadvantaged youth and communities and bring them together through basketball. BBNZ supports Glens programmes, as would FIBA, and we encourage you to consider how There's A Better Way can work in your communities to support disadvantaged youth.

Off course BBNZ also actively encourages associations to develop and run their own programmes and event in schools, through clubs and other venue/facility providers.

CEO Appointment Update

After a lengthy process and a significant number of applications for the role of permanent CEO the Board have decided to begin the search process again. Organisational fit, delivery against the strategy, stewardship of the game, stakeholder management and maintaining and building a performing team across basketball are key hallmarks for the leadership of our game. The importance of this decision cannot be understated – this will be a critical decision by the Board for the next period of basketballs growth and they are committed to getting it right. Further updates will be provided as the process continues.

Drug Free Sport – Drug Free Basketball

BBNZ has begun discussions with **Drug Free Sport** (the organisation charged with promoting this message) about how we can support our players, coaches, administrators and referees to work towards basketball being drug free. The initial discussions have focussed on how we can use our existing tournaments, cluster camps and other programmes to push the message that drugs in our game are not acceptable at any level. Drug Free Sport has retained an independent contractor, **Colin Bramfit**, to work with basketball, softball, touch and rugby league to develop sport-specific programmes. We'll keep you updated and consider this to be a very important future pillar for our game.

Basketball New Zealand Representation on the FIBA Oceania Board

The BBNZ board have endorsed **Burton Shipley** to substitute **John Gallaher** as an observer on the **FIBA Oceania Board**. Burton will remain as BBNZ's nomination to the FIBA Oceania Board when current New Zealand representative **Barbara Wheadon's** term ends in 2014.

John's contribution to this important part of BBNZ's work has been exceptional. His commitment, both professionally and personally has been large. Naturally John will continue to be actively involved in the game but we wish to pay special tribute to this part of his work.



Henare Steps to Next Level



Basketball New Zealand has confirmed assistant coaches for their national senior teams hoping to qualify for the London Olympics later this year.

Former Tall Blacks captain

Pero Cameron will be retained to back up head coach **Nenad Vucinic**, but he'll be joined by former international and **NZ Breakers** point guard **Paul Henare**, currently steering the **HBS Bank Hawks** towards the **Bartercard NBL** playoffs.

After 17 years in the national team and 10 as skipper, Cameron was introduced to the coaching staff last year, having led **Wellington Saints** to back-to-back national league titles.

This is Henare's first coaching involvement with the national programme. He hung up his sneakers after the Breakers' Australian NBL triumph last year and immediately guided the Hawks to the 2011 NBL post-season, losing to Cameron and the Saints in the final.

The **Tall Blacks** will contest a last-chance FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournament at Caracas, Venezuela, from July 2-8, hoping to claim one of three spots still available in the London draw.

Incumbent **Claire Dallison** of Nelson has also been reappointed manager of the team.

Meanwhile, Tall Ferns coach **Kennedy Hamilton-Kereama** will have some familiar faces around him during the women's campaign. Both **Aik Ho** and **Dean Kinsman** assisted him last year at the FIBA Oceania Championships.

Ho was video coach at the 2004 Athens Olympics and has assisted Hamilton-Kereama since 2010, while Kinsman has coached extensively within the Australian women's programme, including a stint as head coach at the Australian Institute of Sport.

The NZ women, managed by **Gail McLauchlan** of Christchurch, face an Olympic qualifying tournament at Ankara, Turkey, from June 25-July 1, with five spots still available in the Games draw.

Breakers Win Back to Back



The **Breakers** have gone back-to-back. And they had to use every last drop of juice in the tank to get there.

In front of a raucous - and record-breaking - crowd of 9258 at Vector Arena the New Zealand

Breakers took the best shots

of a pugnacious **Perth Wildcats** side and simply willed their way to a 79-73 victory.

And with it they sealed a second straight **Australian NBL** championship for what is now, indisputably, New Zealand's premier sporting team.

This one cannot be rated highly enough either, for it was earned against a pretty special opponent who for all their aggression, pushed this fine Breakers side to the limit.

And the Breakers had to overcome some challenges to get there too.

Tom Abercrombie played a brilliant game on one leg, and may have made the most important play of the game on it; and **Cedric Jackson** was a warrior too as he played through his own ankle problems.

But down the stretch the Breakers were simply superb.

After the Wildcats had closed to 62-62 with seven minutes remaining, the home side steadied and came home with some clutch plays.

CJ Bruton, named finals MVP, nailed two massive dagger three-pointers that pretty much sealed the deal, but Abercrombie's block on **Shawn Redhage** when the Perth side had looked like they were going to close within two points was massive.

Gary Wilkinson, who must surely be brought back on the basis of heroics in this series, led the Breakers with another fabulous offensive display, finishing with 23 points (6/13 FG), four boards and two steals.

The word is this club might not have room for him next year - the fans must demand they find it.

Bruton added 16 points, knocking down four of his seven from long range, and also had three rebounds and three assists.

Abercrombie's 12 points, four boards, two assists and big, big block were heroic given his restrictions, and **Alex Pledger's** 13 points in 15 minutes off the bench were absolutely vital.

Cedric Jackson was also huge over the run home, finishing with nine points, 12 assists and three boards as he found his team-mates when he really needed to. And **Mika Vukona's** six steals and seven boards saw him continue to find ways to contribute outside of making hoops.

Perth, of course, never stopped trying.

In Redhage (18 points), big **Matt Knight** (17) and **Kevin Lisch** (15) they had three classy operators.

And as usual their defence and physicality was relentless and rugged.

Breaker, the veteran outfit they are made the big plays down the stretch, becoming just the sixth club in this league to earn back-to-back titles.

It is also Bruton's fifth championship, and arguably, at 36, his most impressive performance over a grand final series.

In a captivating, competitive and almost incomprehensibly close grand finals series that must go down as one of the very best in this competition's history, it was a shame, in that clichéd way, that one team had to go home a loser.

Both sides gave it everything. And then some.

But the Breakers are deserved champions. They kept alive their perfect streak - now 4-0 - of closing out finals games at home, having now won four straight series by the narrow margin of 2-1.

In fact, the Breakers demonstrated how crucial that regular season title was.

Home teams have now won the deciding game of grand finals 11 of the last 15 times, and the Kiwis' latest victory was the 14th consecutive win by a home team at this stage of the competition.

2012 Albert Schweitzer Tournament Junior Tall Blacks



The **Junior Tall Blacks** (JTB's) have returned from Viernheim, Germany after playing in the prestigious **Albert Schweitzer Tournament** which has been going since 1958.

The JTB's would compete in the 16 team tournament with fellow countries such as

China, Russia and Australia who won last year's tournament, .

It was going to be a tough ask for our boys, but it was a good chance for the world to see our talented players such as **Reuben Te Rangi** who was a member of the NZ junior team that won the World Three on Three competition last year.

Our first game would be against the hosts **Germany**, who finished runners up the year before.

The boys got off to a fantastic start leading the hosts 17-10, but were unable to maintain their lead, as Germany would outscore the JTB's 36-6 in the second period.

Trailing by twenty plus points, the boys were able to close to within 15, but in the end the hosts were too strong, final score 86-57.

Guard **Tai Webster** was the top scorer for the JTB's with 22 points while **Alexander Talma** collected 10 rebounds.

In their next pool game the JTB's would face another European power house in **Turkey.**

New Zealand was led with strong performances by **Tom Vodanovich** (23, 8-17) and Talma (15) who shot 3-3 from the three point line.

But in the end the size of Turkey would be too much to handle for the JTB's who were 43-29 to win the game 96-70.

After two losses the JTB's would play their final pool game in Group B against **Sweeden** who were yet to win a pool game too.

The JTB's started the game off well in a tight affair which saw them lead 33-32 at half time

Unfortunately they could not maintain their lead, as Sweeden outscored New Zealand 42-28.

Mark Kelly had a game high 16, but as a team the JTB's were sloppy with the ball, committing 32 turnovers.

Next step for the boys would be playing off for the 9th-16th positions, and first up would be another good European team **Israel**.

Again the boys committed far too many turnovers of 25 compared to Israel's eight.

Webster tried his hardest with 19, but Israel were red hot from the three point line shooting 14/26 (53.8%) to win the game 100-66.

Argentina would be the boys next opponent and would be yet again a very difficult task.

Trailing by under double digits in the first half, the JTB's really struggled to score in the second half as the Argentineans would win 62-46.

Despite 11 of the JTB's scoring at least a point, no-one was able to reach double figures, shooting 32% for the game.

New Zealand would play their final game of the tournament against **Denmark** for the 15th-16th position.

Turnovers would yet again plague the boys as they had 28, but fought hard to only trail by two at the half.

Denmark had a strong third quarter though outscoring New Zealand 32-17, which would be the difference in the 81-62 defeat.

Officials Corner



Welcome to the new Officials section of the Community Newsletter.

We have recently appointed **Melony Wealleans** to the position of **Referee Coordinator**. Melony's role is full time and she will be responsible for all matters relating to Officials. She is in the process of updating all Referee records, appointing referees to our National tournaments, and updating our website. If you are an active official and have not received any correspondence from BBNZ in the last month, please email Melony at <u>referees@basketball.org.nz</u>, to ensure she has your correct contact details.

The **U17 Nationals** will be held in **Tauranga** this year over Queens Birthday weekend (1-4 June) and the U19 Nationals at the same time in Dunedin. Invitations for these tournaments have recently been emailed. If you have not been invited to date, and are keen to attend, please email Melony.

A reminder that all referees attending a National Tournament are expected to be registered. Details in relation to this can be obtained from our website.

The **U16 Australian State Champs** will be held in **Tamworth, NSW**, from 7-14 July. **New Zealand** will be sending two referees to this tournament. If you believe you are aptly suitable for this level, and would like to attend this, please contact Melony. This trip will be self-funded.

Every month we will be covering rules that are often misunderstood. If you come across a rule that may fit in to this category, please contact Melony to have this covered in future newsletters. A copy of the latest rule book (2010) is available on the website, or a hard copy is available for purchase through our merchandise section of the website.

Technical Fouls (Refer to Article 38)

There are a number of referees (players and coaches) that are under the impression that there is a limit as to the number of technical fouls a player may have. There are not (i.e a player could receive up to five).

There is a wide variety of reasons that a player can receive a technical foul. These can include baiting an opponent, disrespectfully communicating with the officials, excessive swinging of elbow or, hanging on the ring.

There is also the misunderstanding, that two technical fouls of a similar nature results in this player being automatically disqualified. This is not the case. However officials are able to disqualify players at any stage for flagrant unsportsmanlike action (Refer to Article 37). Repetitive poor behaviour by a player warranting more than one technical foul could warrant disqualification.

On the other hand, a coach should be disqualified when:

- He is charged with 2 technical fouls as a result of his personal unsportsmanlike behaviour or/
- He is charged with 3 technical fouls, either all of them or one of them as a result of unsportsmanlike behaviour of the team bench.

Goaltending and Interference (Refer to Article 31)

Goaltending occurs during a shot for a field goal when a player touches the ball while it is <u>completely above the level of</u> the ring and

- it is on its downward flight to the basket, or
- after it has touched the backboard.





Aspects of a Block/Charge Situation Clarified

There has been some confusion over who causes the contact when a defensive player has been standing in a legal defensive position for a period of time.

Situations arise in a game where a defensive player has been standing in a spot and the offensive player with the ball comes into the same area taking a line that means contact will occur into the defender's shoulder. The defender has two choices at this stage, one being to move out of the path of the offensive player or move into the path of the offensive player that will ensure contact occurs into the defender's torso. It is the responsibility of the defense to get to and maintain a legal guarding position at all times.

(Refer to article 33.4 When judging a charge/block situation involving a player with the ball ...Contact must occur on the torso, in which case the defensive player would be considered as having been at the place of contact first)

If the defender does not move then he has caused the contact by not getting to the correct spot before the offensive player. The amount of time a defender was standing in the spot is irrelevant, as the spot he was standing in was not the correct legal defensive position to defend the offensive player.

Meet your local Official



Every month we will be featuring an official who heavily contributes to basketball in this country.

This month we would like to introduce **Cliff Horne**, from **Tauranga**.

BBNZ's "Official of the Year" for 2010, Cliff is widely considered a stalwart of basketball.

He started playing in Palmerston North in 1958 and after spending time in Wellington and Marlborough, Cliff eventually made his home in Tauranga in 1974.

When his youngest daughter started playing mini ball in 1999, he became the team referee and this was the catalyst for taking up the whistle and becoming a BBNZ referee.

In his 60s, Cliff is still actively officiating in his home town.

He has set up and administered the Tauranga referee programme, and appointed and educated referees for local games.

Whist still refereeing at the odd BBNZ tournaments, Cliff regularly takes on an Evaluators' role at National Championship.

Refereeing evaluating/coaching has now become a passion for Cliff, culminating in an excursion to Port Macquarie this year.


