


lacobucci focused on Bullants' finals push

While subscribing to the never say never philosophy, Adam lacobucci acknowledges his football focus has shifted this season.

lacobucci, delisted by Collingwood at the end of the 2006 season after playing 23 AFL games, came to Cramer Street in a bid to revive his AFL career.

Although lacobucci, 22, enjoyed a strong season – winning the Northern Bullants' best and fairest and selection in the VFL Team Of The Year – at the end of it he was overlooked by AFL clubs.

Again this season lacobucci has played consistently well. He represented the VFL against South Australia and has again been a solid contributor for the Bullants.

Will that equate to an AFL club offering him a second chance? At this stage of the season, who knows.

But while not wanting to close the door on the possibility, lacobucci is trying not to dwell on it.

"I just concentrate on going out and doing the best I can and whatever happens after that happens," he says.

"At the moment I'm loving it here at the Bullants. If an opportunity knocks at the door, I would take it with open arms."

When he wasn't drafted, lacobucci was happy to stay at the Bullants for a variety of reasons, not the least because he believed there was a nucleus of young players who could take the club back into the finals.

Just as youth gives rise to optimism, its downside is the wildly fluctuating form the Bullants have experienced this season.

lacobucci acknowledges it has been an issue, but says every club in a rebuilding phase endures it.

"When we're on, I think we are capable of beating any team in the competition," he says.

"It's just a matter of doing the little things correctly."

And that's where lacobucci is trying to play an expanded role with the team's younger players. With Josh Vansittart injured for the first six games, lacobucci stepped in as captain.

lacobucci believes the example set around the club by senior players influences players' on-field development.

"I would like to think I'm improving in that area," lacobucci says.

Coach David Teague has also extended his on-field duties

beyond the midfield, at various times pushing him into defence or onto a wing.

"I'm just loving my football at the moment and that's all you can ask for," lacobucci says.



In like Flinn

Werribee Tiger cub starting to roar

Werribee coach Simon Atkins had some simple advice for Flinn Chisholm at the end of his VFL rookie season - hit the gym.

While Chisholm, who played at the Geelong Falcons with Clint Bartram, Travis Boak and Shaun Higgins, made only a cameo appearance for Werribee, Atkins saw a future in the then 19-vear-old.

Atkins had identified three or four young players the club wanted to develop in 2008 and Chisholm was one of them.

But, for Chisholm. 179cm and 78kg, to progress from fringe to permanent senior player, he needed to bulk up.

"We gave him a pretty strong gym workout for the summer and he really got into it," Atkins said.

"He put on more muscle and improved his strength and speed."

Chisholm, now 20, knew if he was to achieve his goal of plaving consistent VFL football he had to heed his coach's advice.

"I spoke to a lot of the coaches and got their feedback on where

I needed to improve and I worked on those things," Chisholm said.

From the start of November until the end of pre-season, Chisholm hit the gym and those hard yards have paid off.

Not only has Chisholm broken into the Werribee team, but he's played every game and become a regular contributor.

Such is his faith in Chisholm, Atkins has played him in the midfield, where his work-rate has impressed all on the coaching staff.

"He just hunts the football and hunts the contest." enthused Atkins.

"We have put him through the midfield, we have put him down back. He can go forward and can kick a goal.

> "Now we're trying to get him to get a few more possessions so he can capitalise on the hard work he's done."

Chisholm agrees he needs to rack up more possessions to have a greater impact on games - and he's working on it.

Chisholm, who played in three losing finals from as many games with the Falcons, wants to be part of a successful Werribee finals campaign.

"We had a pretty new group at the start of the year. We knew that if we kept to the game plan eventually things would come together," Chisholm said.

"And that's what's


happened as the season has gone on. Now we have to focus on the next few games and keep our form going."

For many Anthony Allen epitomises the success Sandringham has enjoyed over the past two decades.

Allen, a dual premiership player, captain, best and fairest winner and state representative, set the foundation of strong leadership that has served the club so well.

Sandringham general manager John Mennie described Allen as a quality person and player, whose work ethic, discipline and leadership matched his talent.

Mennie recalled it was a brilliant individual effort by Allen in the last guarter of the 1994 Grand Final that sparked the Zebras to an improbable win against Box Hill.

He said Allen had been the forerunner to a succession of outstanding leaders - Darren Mitchelson, David MacGeorge, Heath Tregear and Chad Liddell.

For the past 12 years, Allen has owned the Sandringham games record (165 games) but all-conquering full-forward Nicholas Sautner takes outright ownership of the record this round. And Liddell is just four games behind Sautner.

While he may have lost the games-record mantle, Allen said the marvellous memories of his 10 seasons at the Trevor Barker Beach Oval would never be erased.

Allen said he was more pleased for Sautner reaching yet another milestone than he was disappointed about losing the record.

He said the fabric of the club's success could be traced back to the days of Bob Keddie in the mid-1980s and had been maintained by a succession of great coaches like Daryl Nisbet, the late Trevor Barker, Tommy Alvin, Graeme Yeats and Mark Williams.

Allen said the camaraderie at the club made it a place where players wanted to stay involved for as long as they could. Given this, he knew eventually his games record would be broken.

"Nick has been a fantastic player in the VFL, one of the great full-forwards of the competition alongside 'Frosty' Miller." Allen said.

"And Chad is a super guy and player at the club. They are really without peer in terms of the success they've had at 'Sandy'.

"I have no drama or pangs of disappointment about my games tally being passed. Other things run far deeper just as I'm sure it does for Nick and Chad. The premierships, the guys you meet, the lasting friendships and the on-going success the club has enjoyed are far better than just playing 165 games.

"I really loved my time at the club and will always be 'Sandy' through and through."

It is the sort of selfless attitude that you would expect from someone who gave his all for Sandringham for so long. Clearly for Allen, the club always come first.

When he phoned Brad Gotch in late 2004, Adam Cook was hoping for an invitation to pre-season training at best.

Cook didn't have a TAC Cup background, just a smattering of games for Drouin, but Gotch was impressed the then teenager was prepared to commute from the fringes of Gippsland to try out with Williamstown.

For his first two seasons at the club, Cook played every game in the reserves and kicked a truckload of goals.

While he did not get a sniff of a senior game, Cook never thought about moving clubs to pursue more senior opportunities.

Gotch threw Cook into the senior practice matches last pre-season. He acquitted himself well, but in the third match he injured the AC joint in his right shoulder.

Cook missed five weeks, then came back too early. In his first game back, he injured his left AC joint, which saw him miss another four games.

Sick of watching matches, Cook decided to carry the injury for the rest of the season.

"I basically trained with one arm. I just pushed through and made sure I kept playing," Cook, now 22, said.

Remarkably, Cook performed well enough to break into the seniors midway through the season and in one match against Frankston kicked five goals.

With Williamstown's Collingwood alignment, Cook bounced in and out of the seniors,

but gained a call up for the preliminary final.

"The first thing 'Gotchy' asked was, 'How is the shoulder?',"
Cook recalled.

"And, I'm like, 'Yeah, it's feeling pretty good', but as soon as I went on the ground I copped a bump on it and that virtually ended me for the rest of the match."

At the end of '07, Cook had surgery and his shoulders haven't been an issue this season – nor has his spot in the seniors.

While his goalkicking capabilities are well known, Gotch has pushed Cook into defence with pleasing results.

"One of Gotchy's points is that he doesn't want someone who is onedimensional," Cook said.

"You get shuffled around a bit, but it's good for your football and makes it enjoyable."

But Gotch again threw him forward against the Casey Scorpions in round 13 when his three goals proved telling in the Seagulls' 16-point win.

It's been a long journey in many ways, but Cook isn't complaining.



From Zebra fan to rising star

Williams brightens Sandy's season

For many kids playing junior football for East Sandringham on a Sunday went hand-in-hand with an after-match trip to the Trevor Barker Beach Oval to watch the Zebras.

It was a pretty easy sell for such kids, especially when the trip usually involved jumping the dilapidated concrete wall that used to box in the ground.

While Jake Williams, now 19 and in his second season at Sandringham, remembers those days, he refuses to confirm or deny whether he was among those who jumped the fence.

"I might have been," laughed Williams recently.

"But the back gate was usually always open ... it was a lot cheaper than paying."

From his days playing under-11s all the way through to under-17s, Williams was a regular at Sandringham, when the Zebras, in the midst of their historic premiership era, were the competition's powerhouse team.

He then played school football with Xavier College and made cameo appearances for the

Sandringham Dragons in the TAC Cup, before last year he was invited to train at Sandringham alongside some of his boyhood heroes.

"That was a strange thing about going to Sandringham and training with 'Chaddy' (Chad Liddell), 'Saunts' (Nick Sautner) and 'Ez' (Ezra Poyas)," Williams says.

"Those are the same guys we used to see running around and cheer for."

After an injury-interrupted start to last season and again this season, Williams can now officially call Liddell, Poyas and Sautner teammates.

While glandular fever laid him low at the start of 2007, Williams finished off the second half of the season so strongly he thought 2008 would be his chance to break into Sandringham's seniors.

Even when he required an arthroscope on his knee at the start of the season, Williams did not lose hope.

"It put me a bit behind, but I was still hoping to break in," William says. "I thought if I stayed healthy I might get my chance in the second half of the year."

While Sandringham's season to date has been disappointing. coach Andy Lovell says the introduction of youngsters like Williams had been one of its upsides.

Given Williams stands just 172cm and wouldn't look out of place in the Flemington jockey's room, the step up to VFL seniors, especially the game's physicality, is something he's still getting used to.

But, more importantly, Williams wants to be part of another successful era at Sandringham.

It's something he would be willing to pay for.



Cats' lives running out

Geelong clawing to keep title defence alive

After capping off its dominant 2007 season with the VFL premiership, Geelong's defence of its crown has never really gained any momentum.

Sure, the Cats won four of their

first six games, but two of those were against bottom sides the Box Hill Hawks and Collingwood.

And, yes, Geelong has won two of its past three, but again they've been

against the Box

Tasmania.

But Geelong can still make the finals, though much will depend

on its performance against North Ballarat at Skilled Stadium this Saturday.

The Roosters come off a percentage-boosting thrashing of Collingwood, when Kangaroo Michael Wundke put on a clinic up forward, Tom Roach continued his season-long good form and Marc Greig's experience was again invaluable.

Meanwhile, Geelong spanked the Box Hill Hawks, thanks to Tom Hawkins' six goals, Jason Davenport's sparkling form and its VFL list's even contribution.

The Cats, who are extremely good at Skilled Stadium, have

much to play for and all North Ballarat's three losses have been on the road. But North Ballarat may simply be too good.

The Northern Bullants face a must-win game against the Box Hill Hawks. The Bullants have a one-game break over a bunch of teams fighting for a finals' berth. They can ill-afford to drop more games to clubs outside the eight.

The Werribee Tigers, riding a season-high, four-game winning streak, host the Casey Scorpions in a match that has top-four implications.

Werribee will keep its hopes of a top-four finish alive if it can subdue the Scorpions, who, conversely, can shut the door on the Tigers' aspirations.

For Werribee to win much, as usual, will depend on captain James Podsiadly and Kangaroo Leigh Brown, who kicked a combined 10 goals last week.

The Coburg Tigers' spluttering season looks set to continue when they face the unenviable task of taking on ladder-leader Williamstown at Point Gellibrand.

Williamstown, unbeaten at home this season, appears to have too much overall strength for the out-of-sorts Coburg Tigers.

Sandringham can snap its five-game losing streak when it welcomes a struggling Tasmania.

Port Melbourne should push its winning streak to nine at the expense of Frankston, while the Bendigo Bombers can keep their flickering final-eight hopes alive when they play Collingwood.



No Cheep regrets

Cat takes selection



Jay Cheep says

Frustration can go with the territory if you are a Geelong VFL-listed player as Jay Cheep, now in his fourth season, will verify.

When selection night rolls around unless you are James Byrne, the Cats VFL captain, you might be in for a hiatus in a country league.

As Cheep knows only too well, form matters little. If a selection comes down to a Geelong AFLlisted player versus a Geelong VFL-listed player, the former always gains the nod.

That reality was made clear when Cheep arrived from the Coburg Tigers, where osteitis pubis had limited him to less than 10 games in the reserves over two years.

Cheep had come through the enormously successful Calder Cannons program, playing in

their 2001 premiership

team alongside Dane Swan, David Rodan, Brent Reilly and Andrew Welsh. It was Geelong

VFL coach Leigh

Tudor, who was the Cannons' midfield coach during Cheep's time at the club, who recruited him to Geelong.

Since then Cheep's challenges have been more mental than physical.

Two seasons ago, Cheep was left out of the team two weeks before the Grand Final and never found his way back.

Last year leading up to the selection of Geelong's Grand

Final team, Cheep worried he may again suffer the same fate.

"I was thinking: 'God, it can't happen again, can it?" Cheep recalled.

"I had actually played all right in the finals and a few of the AFL Geelong boys were all over 'Lurker' (Tudor) saying: 'You are not going to leave out 'Cheepy".

"I think that helped me across the line."

Twice this season Cheep has run around with Geelong West solely because Geelong's AFL list had a clean bill of health.

While frustrating, Cheep says the positives of playing for Geelong's VFL club far outweighed the negatives.

"You've got great facilities, great coaching and all the (Geelong) players are great and help you out," Cheep says.

Cheep attracted many offers from SANFL clubs after playing in the Cats' emphatic Grand Final win over the Coburg Tigers but stayed put.

"I was tempted, but I stayed because I felt it didn't sit right if I left after winning a premiership. 'Lurker' had been good to me and I just felt compelled to stay."

And, despite the frustration of the occasional cameo for Geelong West, Cheep has no regrets.



Dedicated Dolphin Dickson works hard and delivers

Apprentice Frankston forward finding feet in deep end

Somewhat like a minister
Frankston coach Brett Lovett
preaches the same message
every year to the horde of
young players who arrive at the
beachside club.

While the Dolphins are a stand-alone club and don't have to worry about the weekly influx of AFL-listed players, Lovett is quick to emphasise that playing VFL football is not an easy gig and should never be taken for granted.


Lovett tells the players to view playing in the VFL as an apprenticeship; they will need to spend two to three years honing their craft before they can establish themselves as regular contributors at senior level.

"It just doesn't happen," Lovett says.

"It takes two or three years to physically get their bodies right so they can compete. Kids that get drafted (in the AFL) have got 40 hours a week to work on it so they can get themselves right in a year."

Tory Dickson, one of the heroes in Frankston's spectacular come-from-behind win against Collingwood, is a perfect example.

Dickson acknowledges when he first arrived at Frankston

he thought it would be a natural extension of his school football.

He arrived as a leading fullforward who had kicked plenty of goals for Haileybury College.

"I would kick five, six or seven a week for Haileybury and I came to Frankston thinking it was going to be easy to do that," Dickson recalls. "But it wasn't. I found out that I had to work hard for my kicks."

Dickson also discovered the fitness required to play Associated Public Schoolboys football was way short of that required at VFL level.

Lovett says in Dickson's first two years at the club his raw talent was evident, but he needed to improve his fitness.

After managing three senior games in his first season, Dickson doubled that total last year and is on track to double his 2007 tally this season.

"In the first one or two years my work-rate was one of the big reasons why I didn't play seniors consistently," Dickson says.

"It wasn't there. Brett identified that in the first couple of years and after last season I kept my fitness up whereas in the past I had been slack.

"I did extra sessions, worked harder. I wanted to cement my spot this year."

Not only has Dickson's increased fitness base enabled him to hold his spot, but it has also enabled him to apply greater defensive pressure, a key performance indicator for all Dolphins.

It seems now his apprenticeship is on track.



Crow flying for Magpies again

Veteran soars past 100-game milestone

When Justin Crow says football can be a tough game, it's something he has experience in.

Crow celebrated his 100th VFL match last weekend, a journey that has been painful, challenging and memorable.

For all the troughs - none lower than when he broke a leg that kept him out for much of the 2003 season - Crow has also experienced some moments to savour.

While playing his one AFL match against Fremantle in round 19, 2004 stands apart, Crow has also earned two VFL Team Of The Year selections and a VFI state guernsey.

And after stints at Williamstown and Northern Bullants, the wheel has come full circle for Crow, who this year returned to Collingwood with a newfound enthusiasm.

Crow candidly admitted that as the '07 season wound up he wrestled with the idea of retirement and channelling all his energy into his fledgling career as a physiotherapist.

But he looked at a Masters placement at Collingwood and, after one thing led to another, found himself wearing the famous black and white stripes again.

"They said they needed players. I did a pre-season to decide if I wanted to play and away it went," Crow said.

"I had been battling away for a while and losing AFL aspirations,

but a new environment just rejuvenated me and I started enjoying it more.

"I'm playing to help the other boys now in a different role."

Actually, Crow's role extends beyond filling a spot for the Magpies' VFL team each weekend. Coach Gavin Brown has given Crow a charter to work with the young Collingwood ruckman during training and in the gym.

In many ways, it has taken Crow back to the time -2002-04 - that he spent on the Pies rookie list - only this time he's dispensing the advice.

As for his onfield role, Crow said the emphasis was not about him hogging the spotlight, but more about what he could do to help the team.

"I fill in the gaps," he said. "In the first half of the season. I came off the bench and if they needed someone to go down back, I would go down back. If I was needed to go into the ruck, I would go into the ruck.

"Football is a tough game and at some stages it can be harder than others. I'm really enjoying whatever role they give me."


