Kiama Quarrier's freelance football journalist, Chris Hudson, attempts to sift through the squads to bring you the players most likely to be remembered after July 2006:

GROUP A:

Germany - Poland - Costa Rica - Ecuador

Hosts **Germany** have goalkeepers Jens Lehmann of Arsenal and Oliver Kahn, Bayern Munich, both worthy of any international side. In midfield Michael Ballack, now of Chelsea, is important to them and is the creative mind of the team.

Costa Rica

Only former Man City and Aston Villa striker Paulo Wanchope, now of Herediano, looks capable of causing concern for the opposition at this level.

Poland

Celtic striker, Maciej Zurawski, is their star player while the ageing defence pair of Jacek Bak and Mariusz Jop, is Poland's foundation, but it will be tested.

Ecuador

Have skilled individuals, but will now need to prove their effectiveness on the world stage as a team. Defender Ivan Hurtado is the most capped player (128) and dependable, while 20 year-old winger, Luis Antonio Valencia, on the books at Spain's Villareal, could be anything! Up front Ecuador are blessed with former Crystal Palace hot-head, Ivan Kaviedes now of Argentinos Juniors, while Agustin Delgado (Liga de Quito) will be the main target man.

GROUP B:

England - Sweden - Paraguay - Trinidad

The worry for all **England** fans will be the fitness of Wayne Rooney (Man Utd), undoubtedly the star of the show, if fully fit. But for the first time in a long time, England have real class in the midfield... David Beckham (Real Madrid), Frank Lampard (Chelsea) and Steven Gerrard (Liverpool) can all make an indelible impression on this tournament. Even Aaron Lennon of Spurs and young Theo Walcott could steal the show from their more illustrious colleagues.

Paraguay

A durable side with many talented individuals which could surprise. Two players in particular; Bayern Munich's Roque Santa Cruz and

Werder Bremen's Nelson Haedo Valdez, should pose the most threat to the opposition.

Trinidad and Tobago

Possibly out of their depth, keeper Shaka Hislop (West Ham United) will be well tested to keep a clean sheet throughout the group phase. Dwight Yorke (Sydney FC), will be hoping for some pity from his former rival Premier League colleques.

Sweden

Arsenal's Fredrik Ljungberg is always a player to watch and is the creative heart of the Scandanavian's midfield. Up front, Sweden have one of Europes leading marksmen with Zlatan Ibrahimovic of Juventus, while Henrik Larsson (Barcelona), could be a surprise package.

GROUP C:

Argentina - Holland - Ivory Coast - Serbia

A gifted squad, **Argentina** are in the infamous "Group of Death", which will either make or break the spirit of the tempramental South Americans. Quality in midfield comes in the shape of Juan Roman Riquelme (Villarreal), but its the forwards of Lionel Messi (Barcelona) and Hernan Crespo of Chelsea, which could give them the edge to win the group. Another to watch is Carlos Tevez, if he gets a run, voted recently as the best foreign player in Brazil.

Ivory Coast (Cote d'Ivoire)

Many of the squad play at a good level in France, but Chelsea's Didier Drogba is the class act of the side, while supported by the exciting prospect of Abdoul Kader Keita, of Lille.

Serbia and Montenegro

Former basketballer, Nikola Zigic of Red Star Belgrade, is the star performer for Serbia while strike partner, Mateja Kezman, formerly of Chelsea and now at Atletico Madrid, can make amends for his sorry time in the Premiership.

Holland

A highly talented side, Holland have the squad to go far in the tournament. Midfielder Phillip Cocu (PSV Eindhoven) will be the workhorse in the middle, but it largely depends on how the opposition can deal with the 4-3-3 formation and Ruud van Nistelrooy (Manchester United), Dirk Kuyt of Feyenoord and Arjen Robben (Chelsea) up front.

GROUP D:

Mexico - Portugal - Iran - Angola

Only **Mexican** forwards Jared Borgetti of Bolton, and Guillermo Franco of Villarreal, play outside of Mexico, but it's a workmanlike team with no true individual talent but which could surprise.

Iran

Midfielders, Mehdi Mahdavikia (Hamburg), Fereydoon Zandi (Kaiserslautern) and Ali Karimi of Bayern Munich are the only noteworthy players to keep an eye on.

Angola

Former Leeds Utd defender, Rui Marques (now of Hull), and forward Mantorras (Benfica) are the ones to watch from the African outsiders.

Portugal

The Chelsea pair of Paulo Ferreira and Ricardo Carvalho are the mainstay of the rearguard, but the Portuguese have a formidable strike force to choose from in Luis Figo (Inter Milan), Cristiano Ronaldo (Manchester United), Luis Boa Morte (Fulham), Simao (Benfica), Nuno Gomes (Benfica), Pedro Pauleta (Paris SG) or Helder Postiga (Saint-Etienne).

GROUP E:

Italy - Czech Rep - USA - Ghana

Italy's goalkeeper, Gianluigi Buffon of Juventus, is being hailed as the world's number one, now he has the stage to prove it in a very talented team which includes the likes of Alessandro Nesta (AC Milan), Andrea Pirlo (AC Milan), Francesco Totti (Roma), and Alessandro Del Piero (Juventus).

Ghana

Not as strong as in previous campaigns, but watch out for Michael Essien (Chelsea), Eric Addo (PSV Eindhoven) and Udinese's Sulley Muntari in midfield, while Matthew Amoah (Borussia Dortmund) should be among the goals.

United States of America

USA are a well organised outfit full of running which play with overlapping fullbacks who push forward often. Both Leeds Utd's Eddie Lewis and Steve Cherundolo (Hanover) will be seen to do this. Others to catch the eye could be Landon Donovan (Los Angeles).

Czech Republic

Another 'keeper to steal the limelight should be Petr Cech of Chelsea, while key players Pavel Nedved (Juventus), Tomas Rosicky (Arsenal), Milan Baros (Aston Villa), and the giant, Jan Koller (Borussia Dortmund) up front, should see the Czechs progress.

GROUP F:

Brazil - Croatia - Australia - Japan

No real weakness in the **Brazil** side but ones to look out for, apart from the obvious; freekick specialist Roberto Carlos of Real Madrid; the tireless Emerson (Juventus); Ze Roberto (Bayern Munich) and Kaka of AC Milan.

Croatia

Play maker Niko Kranjcar (Hajduk Split), could be the difference between Australia qualifying or coming home, while Robert Kovac (Juventus), Dario Simic (AC Milan), and Dado Prso (Rangers), should entertain.

Australia

It's the engine room of Marco Bresciano (Parma), Tim Cahill (Everton), Jason Culina (PSV Eindhoven), Vince Grella (Parma) and Harry Kewell (Liverpool), which will enable the long suffering Aussies to clinch a qualifying berth.

Japan

Junichi Inamoto (West Brom), Hidetoshi Nakata (Bolton), Shunsuke Nakamura (Celtic) and Naohiro Takahara of Hamburg SV, will shine for the Japanese.

GROUP G:

France - Switzerland - South Korea - Togo

"Fabulous Fabien" Barthez of **France** & Marseille will hopefully be up to his old antics in goal for a few laughs. A new player to keep an eye on is midfielder Florent Malouda, from Lyon, while Zinedine Zidane of Real Madrid and Thierry Henry (Arsenal), should be enough big guns to get them through to at least the semis.

Switzerland

Midfielder Johann Vogel (AC Milan), is the main man for the Swiss, while up front Alexander Frei (Rennes) should be scoring goals.

South Korea

Midfielder, Park Ji-sung (Manchester United) is the heartbeat of the side.
