lain Potter wasn't attracted to his new job as Basketball New Zealand chief executive by the international standing of the Tall Blacks and Tall Ferns, or the NZ Breakers' championship feats.

It wasn't even a highly competitive National Basketball League, although he's excited by the prospect of working with all these highprofile programmes.

But the real issues facing basketball are far deeper rooted and it's that sense of community that brought Potter to this role.

"Basketball is a very inclusive sport," says Potter, who has spent the past 20 years as chief executive of the Health Sponsorship Council.

"I like that it can be played socially and competitively, at local or elite

level, by male and female, comes." young and old. It's a game for all people.

"It's very contemporary, it's on the rise and it's a worldwide sport that New Zealand is surprisingly good at – what's not to be positive about?"

During his stint with the HSC, Potter oversaw a variety of campaigns that promoted health initiatives, including Smokefree/Auahi Kore, Sunsmart, Feeding Our Futures and Breakfast Eaters.

"I worked with many sporting organisations in a sponsorship capacity, harnessing the power that sport has to carry messages and influence New Zealanders to promote healthy lifestyles," he says. "I also worked alongside many community organisations - cultural, Maori, Pacific, church, charitable - to help achieve health out-

A long-time resident of Wellington, Potter's sporting background is mainly in rugby, where he played at club level until the age of 36 and then coached the Wellington's Marist St Pat's senior side. He was Wellington B forward coach for two years and currently serves on the Wellington Rugby Union board.

"The recruitment process has been thorough," says board chair Karen Poutasi. "Appointing the chief executive is a board's most important task, and we undertook a thorough search to find the right blend of commercial, leadership, personal skills and experience to meet the challenges facing basketball in New Zealand.

"Having just completed work on the 'All of Basketball Pathway Plan', the board agreed that lain was ideally equipped to

The Oceana Goldrush have kept their title defence alive on the final day of round-robin play in the Women's Basketball Championship tournament at Lower Hutt.

The champions needed to beat the **Nelson Sparks** in

a re-match of last year's final to sneak into the top six placings and secure a playoff spot at next month's finals weekend – and win, they did.

Te Paea Selby-Rickett led the way with 16 points as Otago prevailed 54-47, edging past Waikato Wizards and Taranaki Trojans into fifth place with a 6 -4 record.

When the dust settled, **Hutt Valley Flyers** had used their home court to clinch the top seeding for the playoffs, running over **Palmerston North** 77-43 this morning to finish with a 9-1 record, clear of nearest rivals **Waitakere West** Auckland (8-2) and Nelson Sparks (7-3). Harbour Breeze (6 -4) and Taranaki (6-4) round out the championship field.

Former Tall Fern **Aroha Jennings** (Rotorua Lady Vols)
was easily the top individual
scorer over the first two tournaments, averaging 25.1 points a
game.

The WBC finals are scheduled for August 23-25 in **Dunedin**.

quarter, the Kiwis kept their opponents scoreless for the final 8m 56s, rattling on the last 16 points of the game to secure the win. Key to their performance as their edge on the boards, where New Plymouth's **Connie Poletti** continued to impress.

Already one of the top rebounders for the tournament, she helped her case with 12 in this encounter, including six at the offensive end.

Ballantyne led all scorers with 14 points (5/7 FG, 4/6 FT), while New Plymouth's **Kayla Manuirirangi** had 10 points.

New Zealand finished 4-4 for the tournament and finished in ninth place.

Meanwhile, Waitakere West Auckland's **Rueben Porter** had 28 points to guide the NZ boys to a 76-68 win over West Australia Metro and fifth placing.

The two sides were locked together 61-61 with 6m 09s remaining, but the Kiwis scored the next six points to

regain momentum over the final stages.

The West Aussies actually created more scoring opportunities from the field, but attempted 26 shots from beyond the arc and converted only 39% overall. By contrast, New Zealand kept it close, taking just five longrange bombs – making one – but utterly dominated the paint, where they enjoyed a 58-24 advantage.

Porter also snatched eight rebounds, while Auckland's **Kane Keil** had 14 points/eight boards and Waitakere West Auckland's **Geronimo Doyle** chipped in 10 points/seven assists as their team finished 6-2 for the week.

Kirk Penney signs to play in Turkish capital

Tall Blacks star Kirk Penney will move from Spain to Turkey to continue his professional basketball odyssey.

The former NZ Breakers shooting guard confirmed he had signed to play for TED Ankara Kolejliler in the Turkish Basketball League (TBL) after severing ties with Spanish club Fuenlabrada.

Penney has expressed an interest in returning to the Breakers, possibly to wind down his career, but for now he remains committed to playing at the highest level possible in

Turkey.

Penney joins a team on a high in the Turkish capital. Ankara Kolejliler earned promotion to the top league in Turkey, winning the TBL-2 last season after a 20-2 regular season.


Penney had a successful season Fuenlabrada, finishing as the fifth highest scorer in the highly regarded Spanish league, averaging 14.4 points a game in 28 games, while averaging 12.4 points in 14 EuroChallenge games.

The previous season he averaged 20 points per

game, helping his hometown NZ Breakers to their first Australian NBL championship. Penney was the ANBL leading scorer in 2009 and 2010, and MVP in 2009.

Penney was a notable defection from the Tall Blacks' ill-fated Olympic qualifying campaign earlier this month, opting to recover from a calf injury picked up late in the Spanish season.

Basketball Rule of the Month: No Charge Zone

The no-charge semi-circle designates a specific area for the interpretation of charge/block situation.

On any penetration play situation into the no-charge semi-circle contact caused by the offensive player with a defensive player inside the no-charge semi-circle, should not be called as an offensive foul, unless the offensive player is illegally using his hands, arms, legs or body when

- The offensive player is in control of the ball whilst **airborne**, and
- He attempts a <u>shot</u> or <u>passes off</u>, and
- The defensive player has <u>both feet inside</u> the no-charge semicircle area.

The rule is designed to not penalize an airborne player, when the defensive player has "parked themselves" under the basket. Players wanting to draw an offensive foul must therefore be established outside the semi-circle.

(Please note that a defensive player positioned in the semi-circle with a foot on the semi-circle line is deemed to be outside the "no-charge" zone).

The defensive player must start his penetration outside the semi-circle. The principle of the rule does not therefore apply, if a play backs in to the defensive player in the semi-circle, from behind the backboard.

The semi-circle does not give the offensive player the right to deliberately line



up and charge in to the defensive player.
