Nelson Sparks have taken out the 2012 Women's Basketball Championship, trouncing Waitakere West Auckland 61-40 in the final at Dunedin.

Last year's runners-up maintained their unbeaten record through the playoffs tournament, taking the initiative with a nine-point run in the opening quarter and never looking back. They had a 17-point lead at halftime and their advantage never fell below 14 over the final 20 minutes.

Two Australia-based players have been named in the Junior Tall Blacks roster to take on Australia at the FIBA Oceania U19 Championships at Porirua next month.

Coach Deslea Wrathall has included forward Andrew Kennerley and guard Will Soonalole in her 12-man line-up, with another trans-Tasman recruit – Jarrod Sorenson - among the reserves.

"Andrew's a big bruiser from Victoria, who should really complement the team," says Wrathall. "Will's a point guard, so we've got a nice mix of physical players, smart players and real athletes, like Reuben Te Rangi and Ana Haku."

Te Rangi, the JTB's lone survivor from the 2010 Oceania series, will captain the team, while Haku was MVP and led Rosmini College to

the NZ secondary schools title last year.

The juniors have contested the Albert Schweitzer Tournament in Germany and toured China earlier this year, and while they failed to win a game, Wrathall feels comfortable with their development towards this world championship-qualifying event.

"At Albert Schweitzer, we lost all our games – we had a couple of close games and a couple of blowouts, but it's about the learning.

"But the time we finished in China, we were getting closer and tougher, which is what they have to do in games. They've got to come to play."

The glaring absence is new Tall Blacks sensation Tai Webster, who emerged as the national team's star performer during their last-ditch Olympic qualifying campaign.

With Division I US colleges now knocking on his door, Webster has withdrawn from the age-group programme to concentrate on his grades at Westlake Boys' High School.

"We didn't have Tai or Reuben in China," shrugs Wrathall. "At the end of the day, you lose someone, you bring someone else into the mix and you go with it."

New Zealand has never beaten Australia in a junior series, although they came close at the 2009 Oceania U17 Championships.

"I've said to the team, I think we've got the personnel that can have a crack at them," says Wrathall. "It's probably one of the first times I've felt that way.

"It's going to be tough. They can flat out play and have a lot of players from their U17 team that came second in the world.

August saw the conclusion and finals of this competition in Dunedin. Congratulations to Melony Wealleans and Nick Naylor for their appointment to the final.

To date the **Women's** Championships has been played over three tournaments – restricting those referees who can attend. Discussions at the Finals indicated that next year will see an introduction of a num-

ber of home and away games in addition to the tournaments, and potentially the selection of a nationwide panel to attend the tournaments. From a development point of view this was fantastic news as it will provide another step in the pathway for referees, and ensure that suitable referees will be given the opportunity to officiate in this league.



## Rule of the Month

#### Lead Positioning

It has been noted recently

at tournaments, a number of errors being made in the calling of fouls in area six, by the Lead official. The primary reason for this appears to be the positioning of the Lead official. Calls are often being made from area 5 or often area 5/4, which results in the referee not always having the best angle to accurately see contact. In fact in a number of cases the referee can only see the back of the defensive player.

According to the FIBA 2010

Referee's Manual for Two-Person Officiating when the ball is inside the two-point field goal area in area six, the official moves to cover the play around the ball, but always keeps his hips open to the play. He does not need to move beyond the edge of the restricted area to his right. The lead is also responsible for area six when the ball is in the post area of the player is moving towards the basket on a drive.

Whilst the manual notes that

positioning should not be" beyond the restricted area", the diagrams show that the Lead, should move across to this area for coverage which many referees do not. It is important that in any position, the referee moves to see the gap between the offensive and defensive player, and therefore are in a better position to judge contact. Our website now contains a copy of the manual, so please refer to this for visual diagrams of the positioning of the Lead official.

## Kerr Brings Up 250 in Final

Veteran Guard Gemma Kerr played game number 250 for the Swinburne Kilsyth Lady Cobras in the Grand Final against the Knox Raiders in the SEABL South Conference Grand Final.

Unfortunately the Cobra's could not defeat the Raiders going down 58-71, Kerr top scoring for her side with 13.
