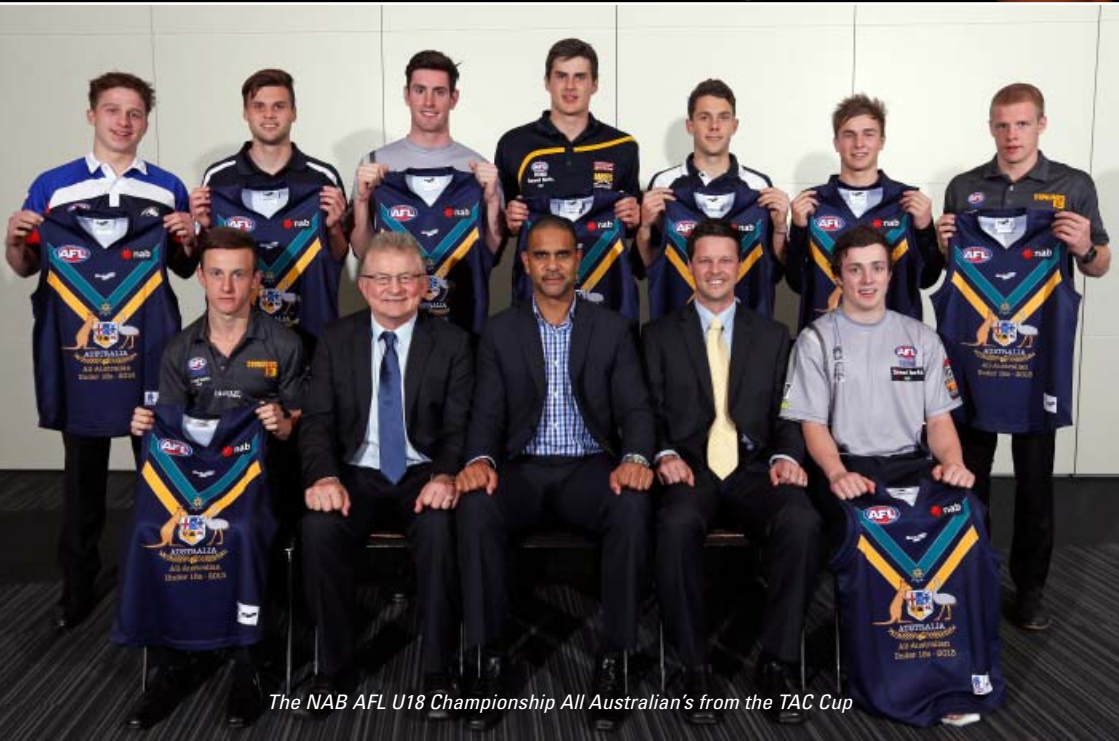

Multiple winners again

FOUR young men – George Cameron, Ben Cavarra, Jacob Chisari and Josh Scott – were consigned to the annals of TAC Cup history last Sunday night when they tied for the honor of Morrish Medal winner.

One week after there was a three-way dead-heat in the J.J. Liston Trophy, the Peter Jackson VFL's best and fairest, the Morrish Medal count, the highest individual honor in the TAC Cup, produced an historic result.

Never before have four players shared a Morrish Medal, whose history dates back to 1947 with the VFL Under 19 competition and whose honour roll includes Brownlow medallist Tony Liberatore.

The Morrish Medal tie will forever link the Geelong Falcon (Cameron), Eastern Ranges (Cavarra), Bendigo Pioneer (Chisari) and Gippsland Power (Scott) players.

It again highlighted how the TAC Cup provides such outstanding opportunities for aspiring young players stretching right across the State.

Cameron graduated to the Falcons from the Geelong suburb of Newtown; Cavarra from Ferntree Gully; Chisari from South Mildura and Scott from Lakes Entrance.

And, that underscores some of the tenants of the Victorian talented player pathway program – identify the talent, introduce them to the best possible coaching, hone their skills and immerse them in a competition that continually challenges them.

Scott is the first TAC Cup leading goal kicker and first "19-year-old" to win a Morrish; Cavarra, a Ranges best and fairest winner as a bottom age player, represented Vic Metro during the season while Cameron and Chisari were introduced during the season to playing in the VFL.

All four are well situated to exit the TAC Cup and take the next step in their football career.



As well as celebrating the Morrish Medal, North Ballarat's Louis Herbert was presented with the TAC Cup Coaches award, judged on the votes of the coaches after each home and away game.

And, the TAC Cup Team of the Year was unveiled, reflecting the players whose impact over the course of the season was the most telling.

Significantly, all 12 TAC Cup regions were represented with special mention of Eastern Ranges power forward Tom Boyd who was selected for the second successive season.

It's worth noting that eight players from last year's TAC Cup Team of the Year made their AFL debut this season. We'll watch with interest the progression of this year's team.

Congratulations to Ranges' coach Darren Bewick, who was named as coach of the TAC Cup Team of the Year.

The Morrish Medal evening also recognised the outstanding success of the Victorian teams at the 2013 AFL Youth Girls National Championships.

The Eva Peers Medal was presented to Lily Mithen (Vic Country) and Ellie Blackburn (Vic Metro).

As well as the Preliminary Finals this weekend in the Peter Jackson VFL and TAC Cup, the VFL Development League Grand Final will be played between Williamstown and Box Hill Hawks.

All the best to the players and clubs involved.

Four-way tie for Morrish Medal

ONE week after the J.J. Liston celebrated three winners, the Morrish Medal topped it with an historic four-way dead-heat in the TAC Cup's highest individual honor.

Bendigo Pioneers Jacob Chisari, Eastern Ranges' Ben Cavarra, Geelong's George Cameron and Gippsland Power's Josh Scott provided the first quadruple tie in the Morrish.

Twice before – 2008 when the Power's Jarryd Blair and Murray Bushranger Fabian Priest dead-headed and again two years later when Gippsland's Dyson Heppell and Sandringham Dragon's Jackson Sketcher couldn't be separated – has the Morrish Medal posted multiple winners.

But, never before has the TAC Cup toasted four winners.

And, in keeping with the foursome theme, another four players Eastern's Christian Petracca, Murray's Michael Gibbons, Northern's Josh Turner and Oakleigh's Jay Kennedy-Harris all tied for equal fifth.

It was a result that saw Scott become both the first '19 year-old' and leading goal kicker to win a Morrish.

Scott's success also provided Gippsland with a competition equal-leading fifth Morrish with Northern Knights.

He joins Matthew Stolarczyk (1999), Jarryd Blair (2008), Dyson Heppell (2010) and Nick Graham (2012) as Power Morrish winners.

For Chisari, the win gave Bendigo its first Morrish success since Nathan Brown won the medal in 1996.

It had been a longer wait for Cameron's Geelong. The Falcons' last Morrish winner was Paul Hood in 1995.

Cavarra, last year's Ranges' best and fairest and a member of Vic Metro's team during the AFL Under 18 Championships, joined former Eastern player Matthew Bate as the club's Morrish winners.

Chisari and Scott polled in the most games – eight – with Cameron and Cavarra registering the most three-vote games – four.

The Bendigo rover played in the most games of the quartet

– 15 – while Cameron played 14 and Cavarra and Scott 13.

Cameron, Chisari and Scott all played in the VFL during the season.

The vote count

Not surprisingly, there were plenty of twists and turns in the Morrish count, but the Morrish winners were to the forefront from the get-go.

Scott, who became, polled votes in the first five rounds.

He was rewarded for his hauls of nine goals (Bendigo), seven (Calder) and five (Sandringham) with the maximum three votes.

Cameron was just one vote behind Scott after the first five games, with Cavarra one vote behind Cameron while Chisari chipped away, accumulating votes.

After 10 rounds, Scott had taken his vote tally to 14, but again he had Cameron for a close companion, just one vote him.

It was also the Round where Chisari polled his only three vote game for the season – against Murray and took him to 12. Cavarra was sitting sixth with 10 votes.

Cameron soared to the lead with his fourth three-vote game against North Ballarat to take a two-lead over Scott and Chisari who collected the fifth of his set of six two votes. Cavarra remained on 10.

For the next three rounds there was no change to the top three positions of the Morrish leaderboard, with Cameron holding sway on 16 votes, but Cavarra had slipped to tenth with a bunch of players, including Petracca and another Ranges' teammate Tom Boyd.

Cavarra made his move with a best-on-ground game against Murray in Round 15, but at the end of the next Round the landscape changed dramatically.

With Chisari adding his sixth two vote game and Scott collecting two votes, Cameron for the first time since Round 11 wasn't alone in first place.

Significantly, Chisari and Scott did not play in the final game. Chisari played for Bendigo Gold in the VFL while Scott didn't play that weekend, which left Cameron the chance to break the deadlock.

But, Cameron didn't attract the umpire's attention in Geelong's 41-point win against Dandenong.

While Eastern suffered a 47-point loss against Calder in the final home and away round of the season, Cavarra was a stand-out for the Ranges and gained the umpire's three votes.

It catapulted him into a four-way ownership of the most crowded Morrish dais and into TAC Cup history.

TAC CUP COACHES AWARD

North Ballarat Rebels' Louis Herbert this year won the 2013 TAC Cup Coach Award.

LIKE most of his age group, Louis Herbert faced a raft of decisions coming into season 2013.

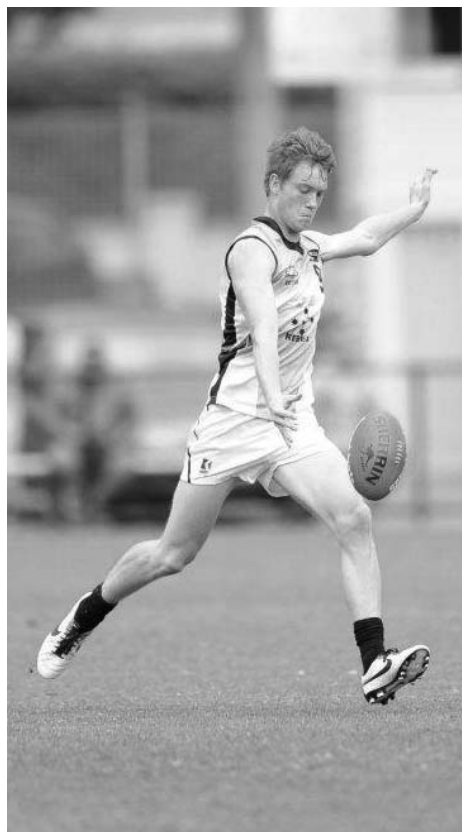
Herbert had to weigh up whether he should embrace open age football or accept an invitation from North Ballarat Rebels to return to the TAC Cup as one of its 19-year-old players.

The latter involved relocating from his home town of Warrnambool, leaving the comforts of home, to move to Ballarat.

It also meant undertaking his tertiary studies in Ballarat as well as driving his aspirations to get drafted.

Herbert decided the best move for him across the board was to accept the Rebels' offer.

So far, it has proved an inspired choice from Herbert, who was awarded the TAC Cup Coaches award.



While North Ballarat's season didn't scale any great heights, Herbert emerged the winner of the TAC Cup Coaches award voted on by the coaches after each game throughout the season.

Herbert polled 27 votes to register a three vote win over Calder Cannons Matthew Merlo.

Morrish Medal winner Jacob Chisari was one vote further back in third place, one vote ahead of Bendigo Pioneers teammate Sam Heavyside and Murray Bushranger Bryden Squire.

It was the second successive season that a North Ballarat Rebel has won the TAC Cup Coaches award. Last season it was won by Jake Lloyd.

The flow-on effects from that Herbert's decision to not only remain in the TAC Cup, but also relocate to Ballarat was that he was able to train regularly with the Rebels – something that had not previously been the case.

It also afford him the opportunity to train with VFL club North Ballarat and he was also able to play as the 23rd player once with the Roosters against Essendon and it was a driver in him representing Vic Country in the NAB AFL Under 18 Championships.

Such continuity and specialized training has resulted in Herbert playing his best football.

Rebels' coach David Loader moved Herbert from attack to defence as well as running him through the midfield.

It paid dividends.

There's never been a knock on Herbert's ball skills, but this season he's erased queries about his ability to win possession and showcase his other athletic talents.

"He's just climbing the ranks very quickly," Loader said earlier in the season after Herbert earned maximum votes for his game against Oakleigh Chargers.

"I think by moving to Ballarat and buy into the program a lot more has really helped. He has grown as a person and a footballer.

"He has bought into the direction we wanted to push his football and he's getting results."

Louis Herbert would definitely agree.

2013 award winners

North Ballarat Rebels star Louis Herbert and Gippsland Power spearhead Josh Scott have both been recognised with separate awards on Morrish Medal night.

After a standout season with the Rebels, Herbert was named the TAC Cup Coaches Award winner (see article on page 6).

Gippsland Power forward Josh Scott was the runaway winner this year as the TAC Cup Leading Goalkicker.

Returning for a third season at TAC Cup level, Scott won the competition goal kicking with 51 majors, finishing 18 goals ahead of his nearest challenger in Christian Petracca.

Scott played 13 games this year, kicking four or more goals in a match on nine occasions.

His best effort was in round three when he bagged nine goals in the Power's big win over the Bendigo Pioneers.

Scott's form in the forward 50 saw him gain a place in the Vic Country squad where he made two appearances in the Big V jumper.

In the TAC Speed Hurts Awards, five clubs received recognition for their efforts in 2013.

Through the TAC program, each TAC Cup regions are encouraged to promote the TAC's messages, including the Speed Hurts message.

The program comprises various practical and educational components including learners practicing driving to and from games, information sessions, and the chance to

each region to produce their own television commercial encouraging the public to become safer drivers.

Each TAC Cup region is assessed on their achievements in each area.

Club by club leaders

When it comes to the winners and the final Morrish medal club totals, it was no surprise to see the two ladders leaders not only sharing the Medal, but at the top of the club votes tally as well.

Top team Geelong polled the most Morrish votes – 72 – of any club, five more than Eastern.

Interestingly, the Falcons had 17 players poll votes while three players – Boyd, Cavarra and Petracca polled 40 of the Ranges’ 67 votes with 11 other players combining for 17 votes.

Boyd was one of the more head-turning performances in the Morrish.

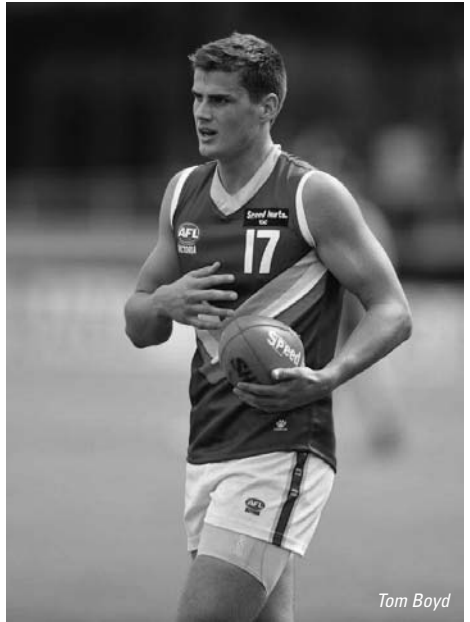
He played just five games for the Ranges because of Vic Metro commitments and injury, but he polled in four games.

And, in those four games he registered three best-on-ground votes as well as a two vote.

The game that Boyd did not poll a vote he kicked 3.5, took seven marks and won 12 hit outs.

Matthew Merlo was Calder Cannon’s leading vote-getter with nine, the same number of votes as Zak Jones and Tom Lamb who topped Dandenong’s votes.

For the Medal winners Chisari and Scott, they were the only Bendigo and Gippsland players to record double digit votes, but the Power still finished equal third with Dandenong in the club voting.

Gibbons headed Murray’s voting with 13 while Matt Crouch led North Ballarat’s with 12. It is worth noting that Crouch played just seven games, but recorded votes in six of them.

Turner topped the Knights voting with 13 while Jay Kennedy-Harris was atop Oakleigh’s votes, also with 13. After the five rounds, Kennedy-Harris shared the lead in the Morrish with Scott.

Josh Kelly led Sandringham’s poll with seven votes and David Iaccarino was Western’s leading vote getter with 13.

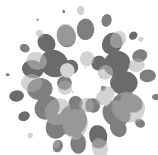

PRELIMINARY FINAL PREVIEW: GEELONG FALCONS v EASTERN RANGES

ALL season Geelong Falcons and Eastern Ranges have been the top two ranked TAC Cup regions, but the clubs square off in a Preliminary not a Grand Final.

Eastern finds itself taking aim at the Falcons a week earlier than many imagined because it lost its way in its Qualifying Final against Dandenong Stingrays.

But, the Ranges rebounded in the Semi Final against Northern Knights like the club that has sat in the upper rungs of the ladder for most of the season.

From the get-go, Eastern, seizing all its scoring opportunities in the first quarter, took control and never wavered as they increased their lead for the first three quarters.

While Eastern ran out comfortable 19-point winners, Geelong enjoyed a week off courtesy of its dominant win against Calder Cannons in its Qualifying Final.

As far as a form reference goes, the Falcons and Ranges squared off only once during their regular season.

It resulted in Eastern posting a 108-point win in a match where Geelong kicked two goals for the entire match while the Ranges posted its highest score for the season.

As dominant as Eastern was, the match really can't be factored into providing an insight into the Preliminary Final even though it was at Simonds Stadium.

What makes it redundant is that it fell during the NAB AFL Under 18 Championship. Both clubs were well represented in the respective Vic Metro and Vic Country squads as well as having many players unavailable due to school commitments.

It is worth noting that subsequent to that match, Geelong lost just the two games – seven points against Northern and one point against Calder.

The Falcons then ended the season with a 41-point win against Dandenong then posted a 40-point win against Calder in the Qualifying Final.

Eastern also endured an inexplicable thumping – 105-points against Western and then lost a thriller against Sandringham by one point.

But, with star forward Tom Boyd and

prolific possession winner Mitch Honeychurch out of the team, the Ranges suffered back-to-back losses against Calder and Dandenong, which created doubts in the minds of many.

Eastern silenced its naysayers last week, but now they must lift again if they are to play in their first Grand Final since 2004.

Geelong's strength is its depth across the board although it will be without Lewis Taylor

Morrish Medal winner George Cameron, Vic Country representatives James Tsitas, Patrick McCartin, Joe Maishman, Hugh Goodard, Fraser Fort and Darcy Gardiner are all quality players who can impact significantly on a match.

Eastern has, as always, been well served by Ben Cavarra, Michael Apeness, Christian Petracca and Mitch Keedle.

The question for the Ranges is has they the depth to combat all Geelong's prime movers?



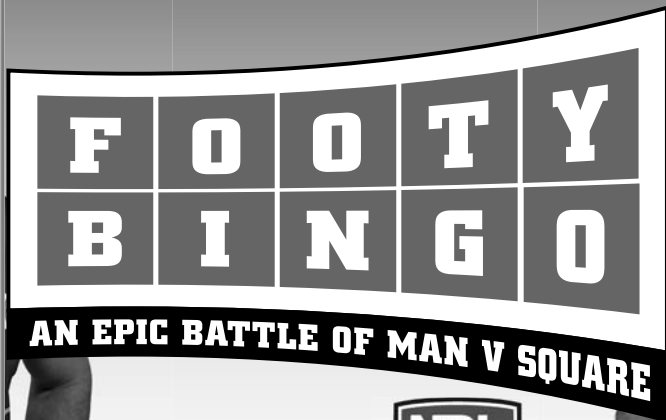

PRELIMINARY FINAL PREVIEW: DANDENONG STINGRAYS v CALDER CANNONS

DANDENONG Stingrays stand in the way of Calder Cannons adding yet another chapter to its extraordinary history.

The Cannons are searching for its ninth Grand Final appearance in the past 13 seasons.

History tells us that no club has been more successful when it comes to premierships this millennium than Calder, which has claimed six premierships.

Conversely, Dandenong is still waiting to savor its first flag. Four trips to the big TAC Cup dance, the most recent in 2009, have resulted in nothing except heartache.

In fact, Calder added to that long-suffering pain when it defeated the Stingrays by 14-points in the 2009 TAC Cup Grand Final.

Both clubs enter the Preliminary Final on the back of strong second half of the season form.

Calder made it to the Preliminary Final with seven wins from its past nine games, including wins against Geelong and Eastern near the end of the home and away season.

After Geelong comfortably defeated them in the Qualifying Final, the Cannons were untroubled to defeat Western Jets by 35-points in last week's Semi Final.

It set up a meeting with Dandenong, which they defeated by seven goals back in Round 8. It was at a time when both clubs had players unavailable because of the NAB AFL Under 18 Championships and school commitments.

Dandenong finds itself in yet another Preliminary Final after it won six of its past seven games. Its only loss was against Geelong (41-points) in the final home and away game.

The query on Dandenong is that most of those wins came against clubs outside or on the fringes of the eight.

Calder's path to the finals was much tougher and as previously mentioned they defeated both this

week's other Preliminary Finalists – Geelong and Eastern.

The Stingrays spring boarded into the Preliminary Final with a convincing 33-point win against Eastern.

Both coaches Graeme Yeats (Dandenong) and Andrew Jago (Calder) will be looking for their players not to do anything heroic, but simply play their role and do the small things required to advance the cause of the club.

Nathan Foote, Zac Jones, Brady Egan, James Harmes, Clay McCartney, Josh Pickess and Jordan Bastinac were good for Dandenong against Eastern. They will need to replicate that performance.

Calder has been well served by Jake Lever, Jake Owen, Reilly O'Brien, Matthew Merlo and Aaron Christensen, who played his best game for the season last week against Western Jets.

The Cannons may just have the edge in a tight contest.

Accurate Ranges advance

the end of the third quarter.

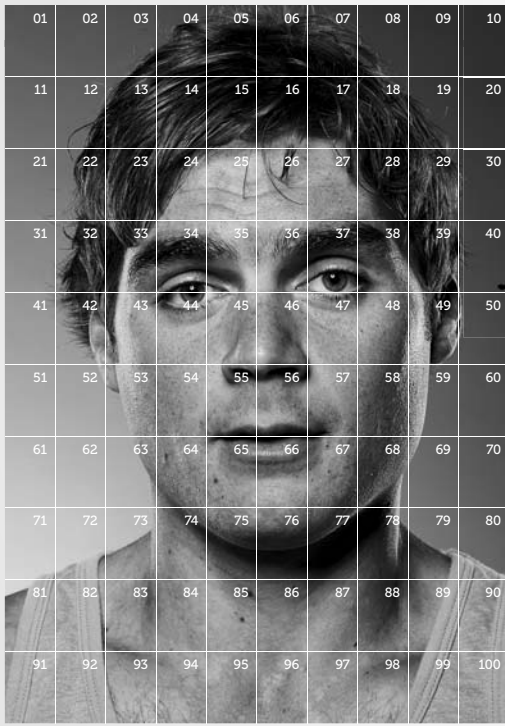

Sam Switkowski and Jesse Tardio were among the best while Billy Murphy will be one to watch in 2014.

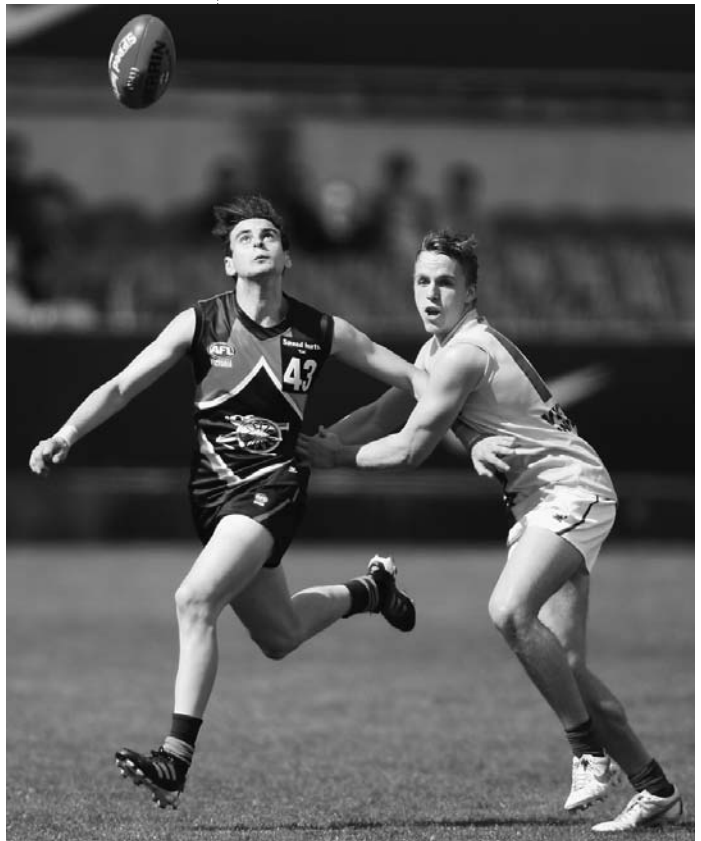

The Eastern Ranges returned to form with a 19-point win over an inaccurate Northern Knights. The Ranges

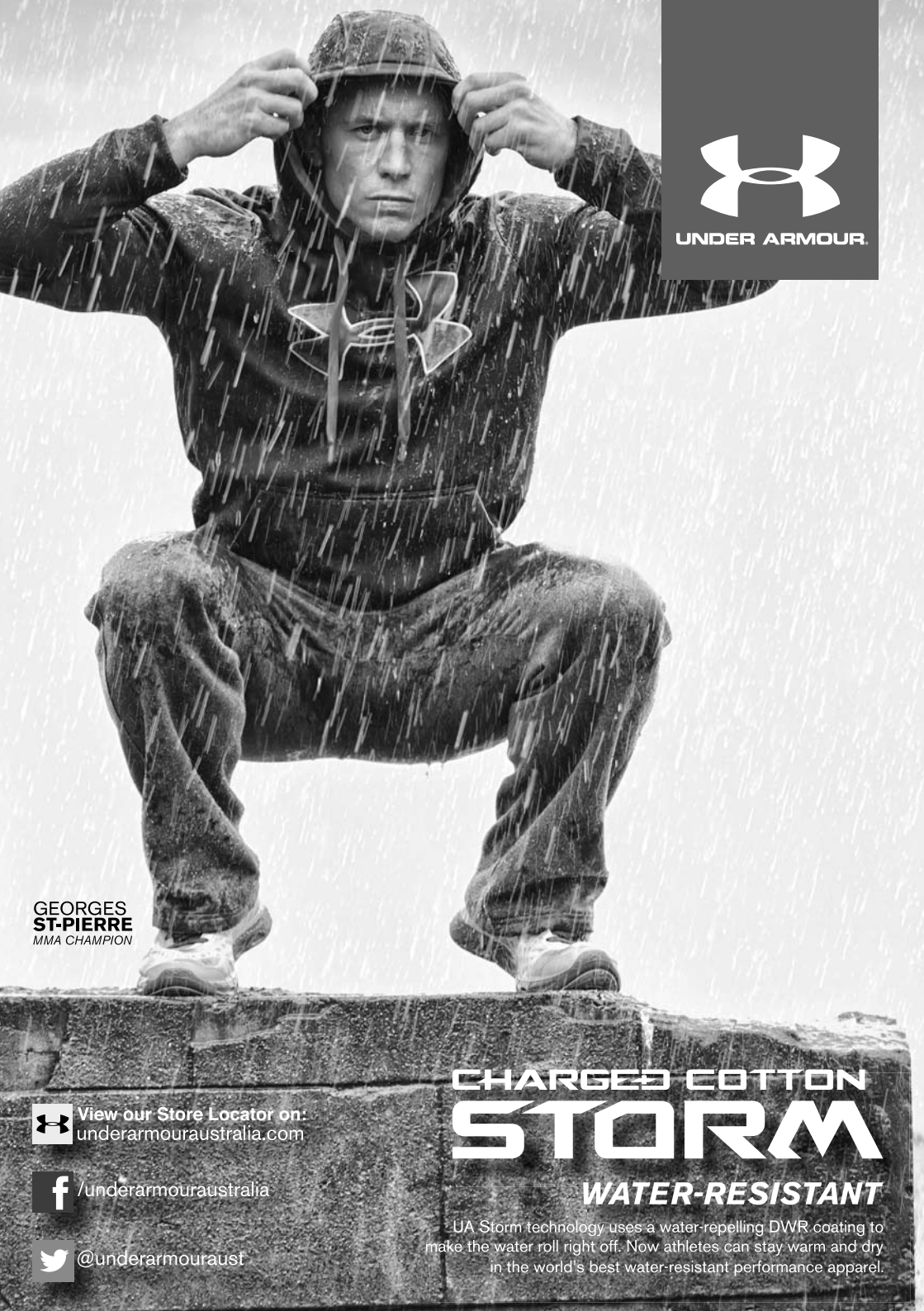
showed the intensity required for finals football from the first bounce. This was the major issue missing from the previous weeks' effort against the Stingrays.

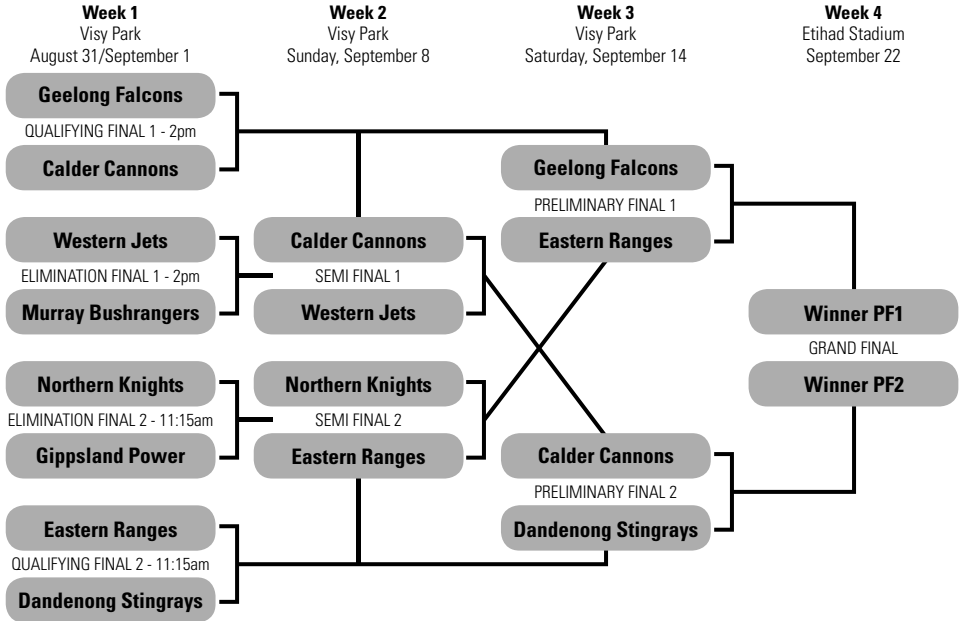

Look Up and Live

Earlier this month Energy Safe Victoria (ESV) helped remind country football fans to stay safe around electricity at the official Look Up and Live AFL Victoria Country round.

To coincide with Father's Day, ESV provided look up and live re-usable coffee cups at country football matches in the hope that fathers, sons, brothers and everybody who works near electricity will keep the cups handy and remember this vital message.

A new TV commercial featuring Collingwood football star Dale Thomas has also been aired to reinforce the message that country workers should beware of overhead powerlines and know Victoria's 'no go zone' rules.

Father's Day was an appropriate time to issue a reminder because workers continue to be injured in accidents caused by machinery and equipment contacting overhead powerlines and sometimes these accidents are fatal.

Victoria's Director of Energy Safety, Paul Fearon, reminded country Victorians to always look up and live so that they return home safely from work.

In addition to the "look up and live" message, farmers, rural workers and truck drivers should:

- **Always know the location of overhead lines before starting work.** Many country powerlines are difficult to see as they are thin, single conduits with poles that are often hundreds of metres apart. These

Single Wire Earth Return lines (SWER) carry 12,700 volts and any contact can be fatal.

- **Never assume you know where a powerline is.** Powerlines can sag by more than one metre with temperature and electrical load in the heat of summer and they can also sway in the wind. They can be especially difficult to see at dawn or dusk. Keep checking their location as you work throughout the day.
- **Always carry out a safety check before you start work.** It will only take a few seconds but it could save your life.
- **Never raise truck trays underneath powerlines.** Store bulk deliveries away from them.
- **Don't move or use tall machinery near powerlines.** This includes elevating work platforms, mobile grain silos, augers, headers, excavators, spray booms, irrigation pipes and scaffolding.

Victoria's No Go Zone rules stipulate that people or machinery should not come within three metres of live powerlines. The rules can be viewed at www.esv.vic.gov.au
