PRESIDENT'S REPORT

1985

It is with a great deal of pride that my inaugural report as Club President has coincided with a premiership year for our senior team.

This premiership was the result of an unbelievable amount of work by a number of dedicated workers, who never wavered from their objective of bringing success to the Club. When one considers that the senior team finished 7th in both 1983 and 1984 seasons, the performance in Season 1985 to move six rungs up the ladder and win the premiership was truly fantastic.

To secure such an array of talent was fantastic, and as such, I must heartily congratulate all members of the Recruiting Committee for their efforts, especially Peter Landers, Kevin Higgins, Peter Brown and Peter Cooper. This influx of players into the Club was certainly responsible for the Club's success in Season 1985 and has made it a "hard act to follow" for this year's Recruiting Committee, which is again being led by Peter Landers.

Without wanting to individualize, there are a number of people I would like to thank for their efforts during the year. Chris Broad undertook probably the most difficult task in the Club by being the Director of the Finance Committee. In only his second year on Committee, Chris took on the job of controlling the fund raising activities of the Club. Chris' dedication and involvement throughout the entire year was outstanding as he not only organised all Club functions, but also controlled other fund raising activities such as Memberships, Aquila Club, Sponsorships, Building Fund Special Effort Raffle, 1 to 1000 raffles, etc. Chris really performed the tasks of two or three people and certainly deserved the recognition of his efforts on Presentation Night when he was awarded the Best Clubman for Season 1985.

Len Alford certainly deserves all his accolades and I thank him sincerely for his devotion to the Club over many, many years.

It would be remiss of me not to thank Kevin Higgins and his dedicated Match Committee of Peter Brown, Harvey Davis, Doug Taylor and Basil Flynn. For the amount of work which this group put in, they certainly deserved the ultimate success. Kevin Higgins, in particular, deserves special credit as his role as senior coach amounts to a full commitment throughout the entire year. Kevin's involvement over the summer months with recruiting was an important factor in the Club attracting the high calibre of recruit as previously mentioned.

Special thanks must go to the Executive Committee for their dedication and support throughout the year, especially David McNamara and Peter Landers. Without hesitation, I would say that David and Peter are two of the finest football administrators in Victorian Country Football, and I thank them for their 100% commitment to the Club.

To all members of the Finance Committee, I thank you for your efforts in making Season 1985 a financial success.

As mentioned previously, this Committee has the unenviable task of raising sufficient funds to meet the Club's various commitments, as well as organising social functions which are suitable to the various age groups within the Club. This certainly isn't easy, but they have been very successful and have enabled the Club to maintain its image as a family Club, with social functions that are enjoyed by all.

To Ross Pidgeon and Ron Faulkner, thank you very much for your performance as Bar Managers throughout the entire year. The Bar Manager's position is often a thankless one, especially at after match celebrations when everyone is wanting a drink at the same time. However, both Ron and Ross are now congratulated for making Season 1985 another record year for the Bar.

To all coaches, trainers, team managers, runners, time keepers and interchange stewards, thank you one and all for your involvement with our great Club during the year.

To our sponsors, thank you for your continued support during Season 1985. Club sponsorship has become a very important component of overall Club revenue, and we thank all sponsors, large and small, for having the good sense to support the premier Club in 1985. Hopefully, the sponsors have been well supported by Club members during the year and will continue their support next year. A special thanks to Australian Portland Cement Limited for becoming involved with the Club by being the major sponsor for Season 1985. The Club sees this sponsorship as a break-through for local football by having a large corporate sponsor involved for the first time. Hopefully, more corporate sponsors will become involved with the Club in years to come.

In summary, Season 1985 became the fruition of all our dreams and plans. The theme for the year was "togetherness" and this concept proved to be most successful. By working together (players, Committee and members) success will undoubtedly follow. Looking forward confidently to 1986 when the "Red and Black win Back to Back" premierships.

TREASURER'S REPORT

1985

The 1985 Season has overall, been a success. The first Net Surplus for Newtown and Chilwell Football Club Inc. was \$7190-25 (Net Deficit for the eleven months to 30th September, 1984 for Newtown and Chilwell Football Club was \$3941-28).

The Net Surplus was arrived at after providing \$1736-00 for Depreciation of Fixed Assets which has not been provided for previously.

Bingo constituted 59% of proceeds and 43% of expenditure for the year.

The cost of running the football teams for the 1985 Season constituted 23% of total expenditure.

As approval has now been formally obtained from all relevant authorities for our Clubroom extensions, I feel it is my duty to point out in the strongest terms, the need for the Club to raise sufficient funds to service our part of the repayments which will be in excess of \$12,000-00 p.a. from now on.

Since we only manage a net surplus of \$7190-25 for the 1985 year it is obvious we have the job ahead of us if we wish our Club to be viable and successful.

At this point, I wish to thank all the people who have contributed to making the Club financially viable during the 1985 Season, especially Andrew Wierzbowski, Chris Broad, Ross Pidgeon, Dave McNamara, Len Alford, Bev Tarr and Jocelyn Smith for their tireless efforts in their various fields of responsibility.

Congratulations also to Peter Brown and the Selection Committee.

In conclusion, the Club has been successful both on and off the football field and I firmly believe that the both go hand in hand.

I look forward to a bigger and better year next year and stress as in previous years, the need for more people to become involved in the Club to share the workload around.
