

I am proud to present the 2013 Softball NSW Umpires Association (SNSWUA) Annual Report.

You can't help but be amazed by the stories and achievements as you turn the pages. I have always said that it is our people that make the difference, and this report really highlights that fact in black and white – it is an outstanding reflection of what the NSW umpiring family has achieved and we should all be incredibly proud.

One of the real successes of 2013 has been the number of umpires achieving higher levels of accreditation. A total of 55 umpires have progressed through the umpiring pathway – a fantastic result from a large and ever-growing pool of talented and engaged umpires.

Progression through the umpiring pathway wouldn't be possible without a focus on umpire development. Umpire development has been one of the cornerstones of our program over a number of years, so much so, in the past two years we have seen a 300% increase in clinic participation. My thanks are extended to the senior umpires who generously give their time to pay forward and help the new and progressing umpires.

Every weekend there are people at the grassroots of our sport who give freely of their time to provide a service to our game. Our local UICs and Coordinators are the driving force behind the recruitment and development of umpires at the local level. I extend my thanks to you for the important role that you play and the energy you bring to that role.

The NSW umpiring program plays a significant role in the successful staging of Softball NSW events including State Championships, Winter League and State League, and special events including school sport. The time, commitment and passion of the umpires who support these events is greatly appreciated.

Our senior umpires have once again achieved excellent results on the national and international stage – results that demonstrate the overall strength of the NSW umpiring program. This year, we had 13 umpires selected to represent NSW at National Championships, and we had the highest international representation in a calendar year in our history with four umpires travelling overseas to represent Australia at international events. I am excited to report that four NSW umpires - Kyira Cox, Leanne Gearside, Jay Gibson and Jesse Smith - have been selected to attend the ISF Umpire Certification Clinic in New Zealand in February 2014. The NSW umpiring family is proud of their achievement and we will continue to support them as they build towards the clinic next year.

Along-serving and highly respected member of the NSW umpiring family, Andrew Rindfleish, was honoured as an inductee into the Softball Australia Hall of Fame. This achievement is thoroughly deserved and on behalf of all umpires, past and present, I congratulate Andrew.

Communication has been a behind-the-scenes focus for a number of years, a focus that is in response to societal trends and is constantly evolving. Social media is one channel that we have seen grow in the last 12 months and I am pleased to announce that the SNSWUA Facebook page achieved a milestone in November – 500 page likes.

The elected members of the SNSWUA are committed to the goals that we are striving to achieve. They have driven a number of positive changes throughout the year and I personally appreciate all their hard work and thank you on behalf of the NSW umpiring community.






Active Umpires by Level: 2013

2013 has been a year full of highlights for the Softball NSW Umpires Association both on and off the diamond. At all levels of the sport, both in NSW, Australia and internationally, NSW umpires have led the way providing a wonderful service to the sport, continually wearing their uniform with pride and setting the benchmark for which others strive to attain.

Accreditations

55 umpires increased their level of accreditation. 100% of successful candidates in 2013 were SNSW Umpire Academy graduates.

Umpire Development

SNSWUA has been recognised by Softball Australia as providing the highest standard of umpire development clinics in the country. A record number of umpires, 20, attended the Intermediate Clinic. The Umpire Development Sub-Committee has dedicated many hours to improving the standard and consistency across documentation and presentation methods. There has also been a focus on succession planning, with a number of new presenters, trainers and coaches exposed to the rigours of the programs. A new initiative, Candidate Folder, was well received at the U15 State Championships.

Membership

2013 saw a growth in the number of umpires becoming members of the SNSWUA - 62 in total.

Softball NSW State Championships

The State Championships provide umpires from across NSW with the opportunity to officiate games at various venues across the state and in age groups ranging from U11 to Over 35.

State League

2013 saw the highest number of umpires providing a service to the State League competition -29.

International Appointments

2013 was a stellar year for NSW umpires on the international stage, with four umpires receiving overseas appointments: Open Men's World Championship, U19 Women's World Championship, Canada Cup and Tasman Exchange. On top of these appointments, four umpires were selected to attend the ISF Certification Clinic in 2014. These appointments are recognition of the SNSWUA's focus on umpire development, even at the most senior levels.

The Future

Umpire clinics were run for players as part of the School Sport Australia 12 Years and Under Championship. Outstanding performances have been seen by many young, up-andcoming umpires who are progressing through the pathway; immersing themselves in all of the events and competitions on offer including Association, Regional, State Championships and School Sport.

UMPIRE ACADEMY - 3 YEARS ON AND GOING STRONG

For three years the Softball NSW Umpire Academy has been a training ground for prospective level two candidates to hone their skills and increase their knowledge. This year was no different.

Eight enthusiastic participants embarked on the Academy journey with eyes and minds wide open, a factor that facilitator, Ron Houison, said contributed to the success of the program.

"I've enjoyed watching the growth of all participants. Thinking back to where they started and where they've ended up, I can honestly say that there has been a fairly dramatic increase in their capabilities," Houison said.

"You could see their confidence growing each week as they tried new techniques and implemented the feedback they were given.

"We were also fortunate that the ratio of trainers to participants was very high. We had eight participants working with seven trainers, so the amount and level of individual attention that we could provide, I believe, benefitted the participants and their Academy experience."

Cumberland Nepean umpire, Wayne Wickens was one of this year's participants who went on to successfully achieve his Level Two accreditation at the Softball NSW U15 State Championships.

"The Academy is a really good learning experience. I've definitely learnt a lot more about what goes into umpiring softball than what I previously knew," Wickens said.

"The level of communication and interaction between the umpires on the diamond was something new. As a level one umpire, this hadn't really been a focus of my training, but the Academy taught its importance."

This year's Academy featured a mix of umpires with different experience levels and ages – a fact that Wickens believes was valuable.

"We had a group of people who all had different experiences within softball; people who coach at different levels, play at different levels and people who have been umpiring for a long time and a short time. We got a good mix of questions based on that level of experience and experience in the game," Wickens said. Three years' young, the Academy strives to continually stay at the forefront of umpire development, introducing more technology and formalising its training processes to aid the facilitators.

"We have a consistent approach to what we do; consistent terminology, demonstrations and feedback. We're working together and maintaining that level of consistency to ensure that we're all on the same page," Houison said.

While the Academy is focused on developing the next crop of umpires, succession planning in the training ranks has also been a focus. Houison believes that "succession planning is paramount" to the future development and success of the Academy, with this year's new trainers bringing with them fresh ideas and perspectives.





UMPIRE DEVELOPMENT

Umpire development has been a cornerstone of the NSW umpiring program for many years. Charged with the responsibility to drive innovation and creativity in the development space, the Umpire Development Sub-Committee continues to set the benchmark across the country for its training programs.

Robust Planning

A desire to formalise structures and provide consistency saw the Umpire Development Sub-Committee embrace a robust planning process across its training programs, in particular the Softball NSW Umpire Academy. The formalisation of training processes ensured facilitators, new and existing, had a consistent approach to activities in relation to terminology, presentation and content. The importance of working together, being on the same page and maintaining a high level of consistency when delivering key messages and techniques not only assists in the development of new trainers, but also promotes a positive learning environment for participants.

Succession Planning

Succession planning is paramount to the growth and future sustainability of the SNSWUA, particularly in the area of training and development. Engaging new trainers and presenters has been a focus in 2013, and that has brought along numerous opportunities for senior umpires to broaden their skillset and take the lead in different training situations.

The SNSW Umpire Academy has proved to be a valuable training ground for the development of umpire coaches, with the involvement of new Level Four umpires Andrew Compton, James Townsend and Krissi Travers. Similarly, the clinics have seen Amanda Houison and Kyira Cox take the lead at the Intermediate and Basic Clinics, respectively. James English has also continued his involvement, progressing through to becoming a Trainer for numerous programs.

New coaches and trainers bring with them fresh ideas and perspectives – something that can only benefit the program and participants in the long run.

Capital Investments

The SNSWUA encourages umpires to invest in their future in relation to training and development opportunities. Taking a leaf out of its own book, the SNSWUA has made a number of capital investments that will aid umpire development for years to come. The purchase of three Zooka pitching machines, two digital cameras and one video camera will ensure that the umpire development program continues to provide the best possible learning environment for all participants and stay at the forefront through the use of innovative and technologically advanced training methods.

New Initiatives

Feedback and self-evaluation are critical tools for the development of umpires. The introduction of Candidate Folders during Level Two examinations conducted at the Softball NSW U15 State Championships were an innovative way for umpires to document their feedback and access additional resources – a method that contributed to the success of the candidates and their ongoing development.

Success of Core Programs

The SNSW Umpire Academy, Basic and Intermediate Clinics and Rules Sessions continue to provide a plethora of opportunities for umpires to access quality training. In 2013, the SNSW Umpire Academy enjoyed a 100% success rate in umpires achieving higher levels of accreditation – a fantastic result for a program that is three years young. The clinics have also enjoyed continued success, with a 300% increase in participation over the last two years.

The impact and value of the development programs offered by the SNSWUA cannot be underestimated. It is the expertise and dedication of the Umpire Development Sub-Committee, presenters at the various clinics and SNSW Umpire Academy, as well as those that conduct development initiatives in their own Associations that enable the SNSWUA to stay at the forefront of umpire development.



STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS - A RECAP

2013 has been an exciting year for the crew in blue, officiating around the grounds at the Softball NSW (SNSW) State Championships.

First cab off the rank was the SNSW U11 State Championships hosted by Penrith City Softball Association in early April. 42 umpires joined in the fun as the future stars of the game kept their parents on the edge of their seats, and the umpires on their toes.

For the second year in a row, rain played havoc at the SNSW U19 Women's State Championship at Blacktown International Sportspark (BISP). With mud caked on the bottom of their shoes and the heavens opening, day two of the championship was abandoned. Every effort was made to reschedule the playoffs, however the rain continued to fall.

The ground crew worked overtime on the diamonds to ensure that they were playable for the SNSW Over 35 State Championships. 32 umpires wheeled their kitbags into BISP for the June long weekend event. But this wasn't your typical weekend of softball with UIC Kyira Cox introducing 'Masters Mind Games' – fun activities including guessing competitions and quizzes to keep the crew engaged during the long, cold days when they weren't on the diamond. The weekend culminated in the presentation of an Australian umpiring cap (number 131) to Lisa Pockran (nee Freeman).

Next on the calendar was the SNSW U19 Men's State Championship. June must have been cursed though, because once again the rain started to fall at BISP just when the competition on the diamond was starting to heat up. The umpires and players couldn't take a trick with Sunday's games abandoned.

With fingers crossed and rain dance shoes nowhere in sight, the SNSW U17 State Championships went off without a hitch at Southern Districts in July. One of the umpires making his debut at the championship was newly-accredited Level Two, Tom Ryan (Hornsby) who was also one of the youngest on the crew at just 14 – a wonderful achievement. This was the championship where the masked crusaders, or maybe they were the three musketeers, made an appearance... Back to BISP in August and the SNSW Open Women's State Championship awaited our blues. This was a special weekend for three umpires with James Townsend (North Shore), Andrew Compton and Krissi Travers (Cumberland Nepean) awarded their Level Four accreditation.

There was no rest for the crew in blue, with the SNSW Open Men's State Championship hot on their heels. One of the most experienced crews took to the diamond, and right in the thick of the action was Wagga Wagga's Dylan Murdoch who made the trip to learn from some of the state's best.

What do you get when you see a field of diamonds full of teams at Macarthur in early September? The SNSW U13 State Championships, that's what! Spring was definitely in the air as 22 teams took to the diamonds alongside our dedicated crew of blues.

The final stop on the State Championship journey for 2013 was the Lee Ruddy Softball Complex – the home of Softball Campbelltown. The weather was starting to look ominous, but held off long enough for two cracking grand finals. In 2010 we had the "Orange Eight", 2011 was the "Sea Breeze Six", 2012 was the "Lismore Ten", and in 2013 it was the "Fantastic Four" as four umpires - Jen Womsley, Wayne Wickens, Georgia Hill (Cumberland Nepean) and Kylie Diaz (Manly Warringah - successfully negotiated the weekend to be presented with their Level Two accreditation.

2013 had it all: masked crusaders, lots of black shoe polish, the odd practical joke or two and lots and lots of rain (and sunshine too)!

One thing is for certain though, every year we are encouraged by the dedication and support shown by the NSW umpiring family to service the SNSW State Championships. At every venue you visit, you can hear the sound of laughter coming from the umpires' room – fun and camaraderie are what makes these weekends truly memorable.

We raise our mask to all who have pulled on the blues in 2013 and say thank you. We look forward to doing it all again in 2014!

RINDFLEISH INDUCTED INTO SAL HALL OF FAME

In life, there are moments that have the power to move you and bring a smile to your face – this is one of those moments.

Dedicating much of his life to the game of softball, in particular umpiring, Andrew Rindfleish was this year honoured as one of 11 inductees into the Softball Australia Hall of Fame.

Andrew received the news from Softball Australia President, Dennis Cullen, via phone at the conclusion of the Annual General Meeting in November.

"I was very surprised and honoured [when I found out]. To be honest I was quite taken aback by it all," Andrew explained.

"We don't set out to do what we do in a volunteer capacity with these types of awards or recognition in mind. But it is a statement of achievement by my peers and by those who manage the sport - an achievement that I am incredibly proud of.

"It's an honour to be named to join the six umpires who are already in the Hall of Fame – I'm in great company. It's great to be seen as one of the elite in our sport."

With over 50 Australian Championships to his name and four World Championship appointments, Andy is one of the most respected umpires in NSW and Australia - one of the country's best.

Renowned for his sportsmanship and integrity, Andy was humbled by the well wishes and messages of congratulations that were flooding in from all over the world.

"I pride myself on being unselfish in terms of passing on what I've learned, my experiences and philosophy to those that care to listen. To see these people do well is a huge reward for me and to have them reciprocate that by congratulating me means the world," he said.

As one of the true gentlemen of the sport who gives freely of his time on and off the diamond for the development of the umpiring program, we stand as one and raise our mask to you. Andrew Rindfleish – Hall of Fame citation, as provided by Softball Australia.

Andrew has umpired internationally from 1988 – 2010. His first international tournament was in 1998 (Open Women's Bicentennial Challenge) and his last international tournament was in 2010 (Japan v Australia Test Series). Andrew was appointed as an umpire at two ISF Junior World Championships (1991, 2001) and two Open Men's World Championships (1996, 2000).

Andrew has contributed to the development of the sport through his work on the National Umpiring Committee including the position of National Umpiring Chief from 2004-2009. Andrew was a member of the National Umpire Staff from the mid 1990s.

SOFTBALL NSW HALL OF FAME: DAWN YOUNG At the 2013 Softball NSW State Teams Dinner, SNSWUA Life Member Dawn Young was inducted into the Softball NSW Hall of Fame.

Dawn was the first NSW umpire to umpire at a World Championship (Japan, 1970). She umpired at National Championships from 1966-76 and was Deputy UIC at the 1966 National Championships held in Brisbane. Dawn also officiated on the 1972 and 1973 tours of New Zealand.

She is the first umpire to be inducted into the Softball NSW Hall of Fame.

Andrew Rindfleish Umpire of the Year Scott Rindfleish - Macarthur

As the NSW Director of Umpiring since 2010, Scott has been the driving force behind significant and positive strategic and cultural change for the NSW Umpiring Program.

A five-time winner of the award, Scott was appointed to his third World Championship in March – the Open Men's World Championship in New Zealand, and the Australia versus Japan Test Series in Canberra.

Scott is an active contributor at all levels of the sport including; member of five State Championship umpire management crews, mentor to more than six senior umpires across NSW and a facilitator at umpire development initiatives. He was also appointed as an Assessor at the U19 Men's National Championship and is part of the SAL Working Group – Rules Exam Review and assists with writing training documents for the national program.



Individual Award for Umpire Development Ron Houison - Penrith City

Ron is chairperson of the Umpire Development Sub-Committee, a role that has seen him drive training initiatives across NSW.

A presenter at the Basic and Intermediate Clinics, Ron was also involved in the development and improvement of Softball Australia's training and presenter manuals.

A mentor for many developing umpires, including three successful Level Four candidates, Ron is also actively involved with his local Association – Penrith City – as well as providing support to a number of other Associations with their training initiatives.
