Treasury Report

After a challenging but thoroughly enjoyable year on the paddock I'm pleased to report the club is forecasting a modest profit for the 2016 season.

This result has been a significant turn around off the back of two serious deficits in 2014 and 2015.

A huge thanks has to go out to the players, the subs collected this year through Sporting Pulse have exceeded any previous year and are our single biggest source of income, having said that they actually came in just short of covering our league fees. Other major expenditures during the season include lighting, ground hire, match footies, training footies, umpires and a lot of strapping tape to hold the old boys together, this is where our fantastic sponsors come in, as without them subs would be double or even triple the current level. Also thanks to the committee and their support cast for making prudent decisions throughout the year and working hard on a multitude of fundraising activities, which are the reason the club was able to contribute to a series of social events within the season with a further contribution to come for footy trip.

In 2017 the new committee will consider an increase in fees to provide funds for a social event sub committee, the guarantee from the club is that the extra funds would be pooled and 100% returned to the players and social members through initiatives including:

- Match day bus trips paid for
- Potentially two trips to Metricon with bus
 and tickets included
- Footy Trip substantially subsidised
- Presentation Night tickets paid for
- Poker Night
- Cricket Day

All at the discretion of the social event sub committee in consultation with the playing group.

So an exciting year ahead and rest assured your committee will be working hard in preparation for pre-season and round 1.

A NEW ERA

THE RISE OF THE LISMORE SWANETTES

The Beginnings

Through the warmer late Summer to early Autumn months, the typical Lismore Swans pre-season training consists of sweat, hard work, late evenings and more running. But in 2016 there was something new in the air, something as refreshing as the cool breeze and something that added a new buzz to the training track. Women. No not the players partners, not supporters, but new Lismore Recruits training to learn or improve their Aussie Rules Skills. For the purest AFL supporter, this was the change the Swans were waiting for and the arrival of a new chapter in the clubs life, a new era, the Lismore Swanettes.

The Swanettes driving force came from Club Secretary Anton Eldridge who was keen to push for a Women's team by organising a 'Sign On Day'. President Philip Tsourlinis was also a huge believer and together they pursued the necessary steps to create the team.

"It's important to give these women an opportunity and a pathway towards the looming Women's AFL League, plus get more women involved in the club" Anton explained during the Committee's Strategic Planning session.

Media organisations were notified and the planning begun to get the message out to the community, an important step in ensuring interest.

The Women's Sign-On day was organised for Saturday March 12 2016 at Oakes Oval, and the first set of signatures and commitment begun. There was no turning back now. It would only be a matter of time now until the first female players would be arriving at Mortimer to get a feel of the leather Sherrin footy.

Participation

When April arrived and clocks were wound back, it was not an unusual occurrence to see half a dozen women learning their own skills of the game, and even joining in the training sessions on the magical holy turf of Mortimer. At this time the club was searching for a full time Women's Coach with Eldridge taking the sessions, and the women even joining in the men's session at times.

"We were never bothered with them joining in to be honest, because it's refreshing when anybody joins in who has a genuine interest in learning the game" men's Captain Timmy Whalan explains.

By late April, the Club had secured former Men's Senior Coach Joey Mitchell as full time Women's coach, a move welcomed by everyone as Mitchell's ability to communicate

the everyday requirements of an Aussie Rules athlete both mentally and physically was essential.

"The pure form of the game is seen again because they are so straight down the line in how they train, and they absorb everything so well. It's refreshing" Coach Mitchell adds.

From the very beginning and one of the earliest recruits, Emma Cumming, a medical student at Lismore Base brought much needed encouragement and enthusiasm to the venture. Club President Philip Tsourlinis was impressed by her willingness to simply give the new game in her life a shot.

"She came with such a positive attitude and was always willing to learn, but also ask questions. She always found a way to have a smile on her face, and was an essential part in forming the new group together" Tsourlinis explains.

"I have had so much fun training with the Lismore Swans and Swanettes this year. I never thought I would learn how to play AFL when I moved to Lismore. One of my biggest achievements was finally understanding the "H-pattern" drill! Thanks to all the guys and girls for being so welcoming, it's been a blast" Emma responds.

Opportunity

Throughout 2016 recruits came and went, some simply realising that Aussie Rules was not for them, others having no choice due to personal life, but some stayed the entire course from start to finish.

One of those was Ruby Morris. A taller bodied player, Morris was present at majority of sessions, and was always one of the first to arrive, and last to leave. One of the great things about football is the unknown stories that lay behind so many people's desire to play. Morris is one of them.

Living in Kyogle, she has had an interest in Aussie Rules for many years now, starting at under 14's for Lismore with the boys, than progressing to an under 18's women's team on the Gold Coast.

"When I heard that Lismore was starting a women's team, I came down to training".

With possibly clocking up the most frequent traveller points driving from Kyogle, her passion and desire cannot be questioned. It is one of the great reasons why ensuring a pathway for women to play football requires the absolute upmost attention and commitment from a committee point of view. Ruby Morris is pictured below.



As well as Morris, there were others who were showing signs that it was the right time to get them game time. such as Jessica Gilfillen. Obviously Lismore still didn't have the numbers, so Secretary Eldridge pursued other options such as contacting Kedron Lions in the Brisbane League to see if our girls could play games on permit for them. Kedron agreed and the scene was set for our Lismore women to take the field for Kedron. Although logistically it was a nightmare, the experience was still worthwhile especially for Jessica Gilfillan who has never

played a game of AFL before. Joining them was also Laura Small, a new recruit who was keen to try a new sport.

The Kedron experiment didn't last too long as logistically the travel was too far and the numbers uncertain, but it simply made the realisation of allowing these women more game time an important measure.

With Coach Mitchell also pushing for more game time, and more exposure, he took it upon himself to drive the women to Coolangatta to train with the Bluebirds, and eventually assist in securing them games.

What also became clear is the genuine talent Lismore was unearthing. Ruby Morris has been a star in the making for almost a decade, but new comers to our game such as Jessica Gilfillen used their skills as sprinters and long distance runners to instantly mould in to good players. All of a sudden, recruiters were on the prowl and our Lismore talent is in consideration. The excitement for Jessica to kick her first goal and the sense of achievement was for all to see. Footy won another person over.

As the season rolled towards an end, numbers rolling up than back down, Lismore can be absolutely proud that it put it's foot forward in attempting to become the first club between the Gold Coast and the Central Coast NSW to field a Women's side.

When that day happens is still unclear, but in 2016 great progress was made and opportunity created, and we must acknowledge and thank first and foremost Anton Eldridge for putting in so much time and effort in creating this great opportunity.
