Season ends on high note

We had our disappointments during the year but the way in which we finished the season augurs well for the future. The Seniors were written off by opponents by mid-season but won 6 out of the last 9 roster games, including stirring victories over Natone and Myalla. Unfortunately we lacked the goal-kicking power to go past the first semi, but we know that judicious recruiting can provide the remedy.

Our Seconds showed we already have great depth in the Club and they provided us with our biggest boost by making the Grand Final. They struck dreadful conditions which affected them as adversely as had the slush of July and early August but they fought with complete dedication to the final ball. No supporter could have been disappointed at the effort. No other Club had more right to be proud of its players.

Probably the most far-reaching decision taken by the Committee during the season will be the efforts to forge closer links with the local community. The Club has been at L.C.Oval for 10 years now and we no longer have the advantage of the natural backing of a clearly defined district, such as is enjoyed by Yolla, Ridgley and others. Therefore, it makes sense for us to make sure that local people, businesses and clubs are aware of our existence, our nature, our progressive attitude, our willingness to co-operate. Accordingly, contact has been made with all local businesses and in anticipation of growing support from that direction we inaugurated the Golden Mile Golden Medal as a promotional feature. We have already had a positive reaction from the Cooe Primary Football Club with which we will now be able to establish a much closer relationship. Approaches with offers of support and assistance have been made to local schools, Cooe Primary and Burnie High, as we intend to concentrate more of our efforts to support junior football among the local boys.

So you can see that the Committee has been active in its efforts to see that this great Club remains a progressive and powerful force in the Darwin Football Association and becomes of even more value to the local area.
