Round 1 Men's – 27th April 2019 Narrabri Eagles v Tamworth Swans

Leitch Oval, Narrabri

The leadup to the Swans' first match for 2019 was focused on uncertainty over the Eagles ability to field a team, with some preseason injuries savaging their playing list. A strong preseason showing at the Crossroads Cup had plenty talking about the Swans in the media, but even with some new faces the Swans were well aware of the danger of not respecting the strength of the Eagles core on their home patch. Stephen Fairless and Josh McKenzie stripped up for the Eagles to bolster their numbers on a warm autumn day on the western plains.

The Swans respect for their opponents was apparent from the opening bounce, bringing genuine pressure in the centre to get the best of the early ball. Some scratchy entries inside fifty and a determined Eagles back six saw them unable to take full toll, and the Eagles midfield lifted to even out the contest between the arcs. Struggling to promote the ball beyond half forward, the Eagles found themselves continually on the wrong side of the territory ledger, which told as the quarter wore on and the Swans skipped away to a handy lead.

The second quarter saw the Eagles able to build some pressure in the forward half, and challenge the Swans centre and defence as a result. With the visitors goaling twice and lifting somewhat in confidence, the Swans forwards found themselves under renewed pressure moving the ball inside fifty. The Swans remained on top, but by halftime the Eagles had made the Swans work for each of their 66 point advantage.

A big lift came from the Swans in the third quarter, who brought a renewed purpose at each contest to get right on top in the game. Better effort saw improved transitional play, and Joe Doherty stepped up as a forward target before Dale Gericke came into his own, kicking a swag of goals to extend the Swans lead late in the quarter. The fourth quarter saw the effort on key Eagles centremen tell, the Swans finishing full of running and extending the margain to run out winners by 144 points.

Paul Kelly was suitably impressed by his side's effort, particularly the improvement in clean ball movement in the second half. Dale Gericke produced an impressive performance in his first outing for the Swans, booting nine majors, named their best and dominating the player's player poll. Jordan Jeffriess-Tapper also impressed in his return for the Swans. The Green Ant went to Jesse Verdouw, who set a new standard in match day luggage.

With Number One Oval unavailable due to some welcome rain, the Swans ladies would have to wait to christen their home patch in a competitive sense. Irrespective, there was a definite nervous excitement about the group who took to Riverside 5 in their first true match in the red and white. A first time local derby against the reigning Premiers, the Tamworth Kangaroos, added to the occasion.

The first women's derby stated much the same as many of the men's editions, with hard football providing little space and presenting both teams with very few chances inside forward fifty. The Swans found some space to open up with some good running footy to find Daisy George, who snapped to kick the first goal for the Lady Swans, which saw out the scoring for the first quarter.

The second quarter was much the same, with the effort at the ball from both teams presenting neither with space to create telling attacking chances. The Kangaroos fought back into the contest, but the Swans defence limited them to four minor scores to maintain a two point lead into the main break.

With both teams determined to press their claims to the game, the third quarter became more scrappy in the face of strong pressure across the ground. The Swans remained up for the fight, but the Kangaroos experience saw them able to maintain better structure to capitalise on the bounce of the ball. Finding forward targets with cleaner ball late in the game, the Kangaroos produced a strong fourth quarter to get the better of a valiant Swans team by 19 points.

A proud Swans coach Andrew Donohue was full of praise for a good team effort from the ladies, whose boundless enthusiasm saw them close to upsetting their more experienced rivals. Dani Robson was named the Swans best, with a hardworking Billie Mitchell winning the Player's Player vote. Gabby Joice won the Green Ant for making sure her baggage fetcher earned his keep.

Round 2 Men's – 4th May 2019 Gunnedah Bulldogs v Tamworth Swans

Wolsley Park, Gunnedah

There was quite a focus on the Bulldogs-Swans match in round 2, after both had posted impressive wins the week before. Despite some key outs and some further late withdrawals, the Swans were keen to step up to the plate against the Bulldogs, a good measuring stick on the boom that had been about the Swans in the lead up. A wet Friday saw a soft Wolsley Park under foot, as a fine day greeted the two combatants.

The Bulldogs started like they were expecting a genuine contest, and the step up in intensity in the middle maybe caught the Swans a little by surprise. The visitors rose the challenge, and for the first part the teams traded even blows between the arcs. The Bulldogs cleaner ball movement and sharp entries inside 50 were a clear difference, but the Swans were still well in the game despite trailing by 19 at the first break.

The second quarter saw the Bulldogs genuinely kick off, taking charge of the midfield and pouring the pressure onto the Swans back six. Though they remained resilient under genuine challenge, the centre dominance of the Bulldogs told, and with the Swans struggling with some key match ups the Bulldogs piled on the goals to take a commanding lead of 56 points into half time.

The Swans were urged to lift their effort into the third period, and they did, and were rewarded with some genuine attacking pressure as a result. The Swans disposal in the front half continued to let them down at times, and the Bulldogs being much cleaner were able to make better use of the ball they won. The Swans battled away in the fourth quarter, but were exposed by the stronger run from the Bulldogs, and the effort of chasing became apparent. Some quality goals saw the Bulldogs extend their lead to run out clear victors by 94 points.

Though clearly beaten, and the second quarter aside, the Swans effort was not nearly as bad as the margain would indicate, and their response in the third quarter was encouraging. Josh Cruickshank was a shining light with a strong effort across half forward, and he was named the Swans' best and Player's Player. Jayden Taylor, Jesse Verdouw and Liam Dunn also impressed, with a special mention to the three goal effort from late inclusion Damien Wendt. The Green Ant went to Andrew Finlay for outlasting all except the boys in blue the previous weekend.

Round 3 Women's – 11th May 2019 Tamworth Swans v Inverell Saints

No. 1 Oval, Tamworth

The Swans' ladies hit Number One Oval for the first time in their second match in the AFL North West NSW, taking on the other half of last year's Grand Final in the Inverell Saints. Even the breeze coming off Hanging Rock snow on a very brisk Tamworth morning couldn't take the heat out of the enthusiasm of the Swans, who were keen to test themselves further after their first taste of competitive footy.

The Saints were fast out of the blocks though, their experience at the clearance giving them first use of the ball, and structure across half forward pinning the Swans at their defensive end. With the Swans struggling to clear the ball, the field pressure and effective ball movement from the Saints saw them skip out to a handy early lead. With a restructure late in the first quarter, the Swans backline did well into the second quarter as the Saints continued on the attack. Repelling many of their opponent's advances, the Swans midfield worked hard but struggled for clean ball and found it difficult to push the ball into the forward half. The Saints experience became telling, as they were able to make better use of the ball they had won to push their lead out to 39 points at halftime.

Despite the score, the Swans stuck to their guns in the second half. The backline determination didn't falter, and some game efforts through the centre and strong marking in the forward half saw the Saints defence under pressure for the first time in the match. Rewarded with some set shots, the Swans were not rewarded with a score, whilst the Saints structure saw them able to move the ball effectively into attack to stretch their advantage and run out decisive victors by 66 points.

Swans coach Andrew Donohue was impressed with the spirit and effort shown by his charges against a much more experienced outfit. Billie Mitchell worked hard and won plenty of tough ball in the middle, and she was named the Swans best and Player's Player just ahead of a brave ruck performance from Lara Taggart. The Green Ant went to Maddison Sharp, who got away with a text book rugby pass.

Round 3 Men's – 11th May 2019 Tamworth Swans v Inverell Saints

No. 1 Oval, Tamworth

Back at home for the first time in the new season, the Swans were keen to made amends for a disappointing loss the week before. The return of some key players provided a confidence boost, but there was no illusion of the size of the task at hand, facing the 2018 Premiers and regular League yard stick in the Inverell Saints.

The Swans opened the match with a flurry, strong efforts at the early contested ball seeing them earn the best of the field position at the start of the match. Bringing numbers to the ball and moving it forward with confidence, the Swans skipped away to an early lead. Inevitably the Saints lifted their efforts, with tough challenges across each line a hallmark of the first half. The Swans took a slender lead into the first break, but with the Saints making the best of their sights on goal there was nothing separating the two at half time.

Feeling like they had the better of the match to that point, the Swans were expecting a reply from the Saints into the third quarter. The contest between the arcs remained even, both sides applying pressure to ball carriers and challenging hard for any loose ball. The Swans carved out opportunities, but failed to fully capitalise to keep the Saints under scoreboard pressure, and the visitors had eeked out a gap into the last term. Paul Kelly remained upbeat after the match, impressed by what he described as the best football the Swans had played against Inverell in nearly ten years. Liam Dunn was a standout across half back, staunch in defence and launching the Swans on the attack, with a long range goal a proper highlight. He was named the Swans best along with the Player's Player. The Green Ant went to Stephen Fairless, who had some places to be over the weekend.

Round 4 Women's – 18th May 2019 Inverell Saints v Tamworth Swans

Varley Oval, Inverell

Despite a heavy defeat at home against the Saints a week prior, the Swans ladies were keen to continue their development and face up to the same opponents in the Sapphire City. There was some disappointment in the late withdrawal of co-captain Daisy George with injury, but the enthusiasm of the Swans was still on show as they ran out onto a pristine Varley Oval.

The Saints were certainly there to play football, their experience at the clearances evident again from the start as they had the better of the early ball. The Swans worked hard but impressively clean ball movement and strong marking in the forward fifty saw the Saints post a string of goals in the first quarter. The early exchanges saw the Swans finding it difficult to penetrate into the forward half, but as the game developed they started to make use of Maddi Pearce's strong ruck efforts to gain some of the first use of the ball. With improved field position, their determination at the contested ball earnt an attacking free kick, from which a neat kick and mark exchange produced a goal by Amee Hogarth in her Swans debut. The hosts clearly had the better of the first half though, and went into the main break with a 63 point lead.

The second half saw the Swans take the challenge back up to the Saints, with the clearances becoming more balanced and the Swans running into space, and able to promote the ball with more efficiency as the game developed. Defensively, strong tackling and some hard spoiling frustrated the Saints clean ball from the first half, forcing the hosts to work harder for each glimpse at goal. The Saints remained more decisive with their ball movement and were able to make better use of their entries inside fifty, which told on the scoreboard, but the Swans battled away at each contest to the end even facing a 107 point deficit at full time.

Bianca Hughes turned out a strong defensive effort at full back and was named the Swans best. Madeleine Pearce similarly was strong in the ruck to take out the Player's Player, narrowly ahead of a brave Sasha Verdouw who continued to be a key midfield contributor despite being on the wrong end of a heavy collision in the centre of the ground. Round 5 Women's – 25th May 2019 Tamworth Swans v New England Nomads

No. 1 Oval, Tamworth

With two tough games against the League leaders behind them, the Tamworth Swans turned their sights back home to Number One Oval, looking forward to testing themselves against the Nomads in a match that looked likely to be more competitive. A cool morning broke into a deceptively warm early afternoon for the lunchtime start.

The game opened with the balance that was expected, the Nomads with a clear ruck advantage getting the first use of the ball, but the Swans midfield pressure stopped any easy advancing from the clearances. With some experience in the centre, the Nomads found the better of the early field position, but a stoic Swans defence kept them to only minor scores. As the game opened, the Swans found space on the counter and looked dangerous on the attack, and when Lara Taggart's hard running was rewarded with a true snap the Swans looked ready to truly challenge for their first win. With the game still evenly poised, the Swans were upbeat going into half time with a four point advantage.

With the Nomads also looking for their first win of the season, the tempo stepped up after the long break. A near full strength Swans outfit made their third trip for the year to Varley Oval, keen to grasp the opportunity presented to them and to finish off what had been a wonderful maiden season with a bang.

The Swans got out to a great start, with positive play through midfield taking them on the first attack, and leading to an early goal through Gabrielle Joice. The lead was short lived though, the Kangaroos responding quickly to level with a major score of their own as the match intensity lifted. The Swans midfield were looking strong, earning the better of the hard ball, but with the Kangaroos backline working well found it difficult to link with their forward line. The Swans midfield worked hard off the ball, getting numbers around the contest and to fetch the ball out of the backline and into attack. With that the Swans looked poised to go on with job, but the determined Kangaroos defence stood solid, and late in the game saw them carry the ball well into the forward line to find their third goal and seal a ten point win.


